## Prescription

A study of the design and implementation of research studies in Applied Linguistics.

#### **Course content**

This course explores methodological issues in conducting applied linguistics research, especially research in the area of (instructed) second language acquisition. During the course, we will follow the research process from the formulation of a research question to the research report. Different types of research designs and data analysis will be exemplified and discussed, with an emphasis throughout on the validity and reliability of research methods, and the need for caution in interpreting findings. Students will set up their own small-scale research project, report on its development and give constructive feedback to their peers.

# **Course learning objectives (CLOs)**

Students who pass this course will be able to:

- 1. Synthesise research publications addressing a topic of their interest in the domain of applied linguistics;
- 2. formulate answerable research questions in response to an unresolved issue;
- 3. make a justified choice of research methodology to address a specific question;
- 4. conduct a small-scale study to pilot the methodology;
- 5. analyse the results, and discuss the implications;
- 6. report research in a way that accords with EAP customs in our research community.

## **Teaching format**

The course is delivered in two modes: on campus and by distance.

On campus classes are run as workshops.

For distance students, the course is delivered on-line through <u>http://blackboard.vuw.ac.nz</u>. In both modes, students are expected to participate actively in activities and discussions.

#### Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- 1. Submit both assignments
- 2. Attend at least 8 of the 10 two-hour sessions (campus students)
- 3. Respond to the weekly questions posted on Blackboard (distance students).

## Workload

It is anticipated that students will invest 150 hours in this course, which includes attending classes / contributing to the discussion board on Blackboard, reading the essential and recommended texts, and preparing the assessment items.

The following table outlines the assessment components for LALS 541:

The criteria for marking correspond to those commonly used in evaluations of research papers (*cf.* LALS 540), most notably: the coherence and clarity of argumentation, the pertinence and answerability of the research questions, the connections with the research literature on the chosen topic, the suitability of the research method chosen to answer a research question, the appropriateness of the data analysis, and the logic of the conclusions and implications drawn from the data.

## Submission and return of work

Both assignments are to be submitted electronically via Blackboard. Feedback will be given to students also via Blackboard.

# Penalties

No penalty will be imposed if you obtain permission to submit the assignment after the deadline. Late work will not be accepted unless prior arrangements have been made with the course coordinator. Also consult the course coordinator in case your text exceeds the word limit. Without prior arrangements in that regard, the course coordinator maintains the right to give only minimal feedback on the text.

## Set texts

Articles to exemplify diverse types of research methods in applied linguistics will be made available on the LALS 541 Blackboard site.

Further recommended reading will be made available on Blackboard to cater to individual students' needs and interests.

# Student feedback

The previous version of the course was similar to the current version, with students developing a research project of their own. As a final assignment, students were asked to write about how they would go about analysing and reporting imagined data. Students commented that writing about fictitious data was harder than actually piloting the proposed method and reporting real data.

As a result, the current version of the course encourages actual data collection (albeit at a very small scale), so that a 'real' results section can be included at the end of the second assignment.
