Prescription

This course surveys how fundamental concepts in linguistic description are applied to the analysis of structures in signed languages, at the levels of phonology, morphology, lexicon and syntax. Sociolinguistic issues of variation and language contact will be examined in relation to NZSL.

Course content

A schedule of lecture topics and relevant readings will be provided in class, and posted in Blackboard, *Course Information*.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1. Understand distinctions between language and mode, natural sign language and artificial sign systems, sign language and gesture.
- 2. Identify formational parameters and basic phonological processes in signs.
- 3. Explain morphological characteristics and processes in signed languages, including inflection and derivation of signs.
- 4. Describe characteristics of the lexicon of NZSL, including origins, semantic features of signs (eg, visual motivation and metaphor) and the organising principles of a SL dictionary.
- 5. Discuss issues and patterns in the syntax of signed languages, including the effects of spatial reference, non-manual features and simultaneity.
- 6. Describe sources of internal variation in signed languages, in relation to social factors of age, region, gender, language acquisition background, and in relation to situational factors.

Teaching format

Teaching and learning in this course will comprise lectures, discussions and lab activities in tutorials. Reading and language data samples will be available in Course Resources folders on Blackboard. Students are expected to complete assigned readings prior to tutorials. Peer learning will be a component of this course: students without prior experience of communication in sign language will develop some practical knowledge through course activities supported by those students who do have sign language skills. Similarly, students with more theoretical knowledge of linguistics will support others with less, during class activities.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- 1. Submit all four assessment tasks
- 2. Attend at least 8 out of 10 tutorials (tutorial attendance will be marked).

Workload

Students can expect to do approximately 13 hours of work per week averaged across the trimester. This includes 3 lecture hours, 1 tutorial hour, readings, study and assessment tasks.
