Prescription

This course presents a range of literary works, studied in their original Spanish versions, produced by Spanish and Latin American writers in the twentieth century. As well as setting the texts within the sociopolitical context of the contemporary Hispanic world, this course aims to introduce students to relevant themes explored in contemporary literary criticism.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Upon completing the course successfully students will be able to:

- 1. demonstrate a detailed knowledge and understanding of the literary works studied;
- 2. discuss these texts in spoken and written analysis;
- 3. demonstrate a knowledge of selected aspects of political and social history of twentieth-century Spain and Latin America in relation to these texts.

Teaching format

This course is delivered through two lectures and one tutorial per week. The lectures will focus on the primary texts that are studied in the course, including discussion of the socio-political contexts relevant to these works and aspects of contemporary literary criticism. The tutorials will focus on the development of analytical skills through discussion of the primary texts and other set readings, and will also be used for the presentation of student seminars.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50% students are required to do the following, unless specific exemptions have been agreed to:

- (i) give the seminar presentation on the date scheduled;
- (ii) complete the two essays by the due dates;
- (iii) sit the final exam on the schedule date;
- (iv) attend a minimum of 80% of the tutorials.

Workload

The University Assessment Handbook has laid down guidelines as to the number of hours per week which students are expected to devote to a course in order to maintain satisfactory progress. Students enrolling in a 300-level one-trimester 20-point course should work on average 13 hours per week including contact hours - i.e., in the case of SPAN 312, 10 hours of private study outside class time.

Assessment requirements

Assessment for SPAN 312 consists of 100% in-term assessment as follows:

The relevant dates for the pieces of assessed work are detailed in the Course Programme. All of the pieces of assessment for SPAN 312 relate to all three of the course objectives.

Submission and return of work

Tidy presentation is essential. Work may be typed or neatly handwritten. Crossings-out indicate that a piece of work is still at draft stage. Allow space for corrections: leave a 4-centimetre margin and write or type on alternate lines. Do not write in pencil.

All assignments should include a cover sheet available from SLC office. Assignments are to be handed in to the Spanish assignment slot located to the left of the SLC Office area on the 6th floor of von Zedlitz. Detailed guidelines for the presentation of essays will be distributed with the essay topics. Marked work will either be returned in class or be made available for collection from the SLC office. Please bring your student ID card with you when you come to collect your work.

Penalties

The due dates for the assignments given in the Course Programme *must* be adhered to. Although work may be accepted late in special circumstances, the Course Coordinator should always be contacted on or before the due dates if there is a problem. The penalty for work presented late without prior approval is a 5% deduction per day.

Please note that no work for assessment will be accepted after 25 October.
