Prescription

'100% pure', 'God's own country', 'the social laboratory': New Zealanders have made grand claims about the nature of their society. This course uses historical events, stories, songs and films to study contemporary New Zealand society through the lens of these claims.

Course content

This course will be organised around weekly themes, with lectures, discussion and field-trips to illustrate these themes:

January 6, Week 1: People and the Land January 13, Week 2: Wellington Harbour January 20, Week 3: Māori culture in the 20th and 21st Century January 27, Week 4: New Zealand and the World February 3, Week 5: Immigration and Emigration February 10, Week 6: Wrap-up, Revision, Test

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1: Critically analyse the way New Zealand has represented itself and been represented.
- 2: Explain aspects of New Zealand history and culture.
- 3: Demonstrate basic research skills, including finding and summarising relevant academic material.
- 4: Write in an academic register and style.
- 5: Apply ideas discussed in class in new contexts.

Teaching format

FHSS 101 taught in three two hour seminars per week. The seminars are a combination of lectures, discussion and small group work. Students are expected to attend classes regularly, take part in class discussion, and keep up with the reading.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- 1. Submit the written work specified for this course
- 2. Attend 12 out of 18 seminars

Workload

In accordance with Faculty Guidelines, this course has been constructed on the assumption that students will devote 200 hours to the course throughout the trimester. This includes weekly attendance at seminars, completion of all set weekly readings, completing activities outside of class for weekly responses and research and writing for assessment tasks.

Assessment

Submission and return of work

Assignments should be submitted to the course co-ordinator at a seminar or during office hours. If this is not possible, then contact the course-coordinator to arrange an alternative method of submission. Assignments will be returned in seminars. The text can be collected directly from the course co-ordinator.

Penalties

Students will be penalised for late submission of assignments – a deduction of 5% for the first weekday late, and 2% per weekday thereafter, up to a maximum of 10 weekdays. Work that is more than 10 weekdays late can be accepted for mandatory course requirements but may not be marked. Penalties may be waived if there are valid grounds (for example, illness [presentation of a medical certificate will be necessary] or similar other contingencies). In such cases, students should get in touch with the course coordinator as soon as possible.

Some of the suggested activities for the weekly reflection may cost a small amount of money, but for each week a free alternative will be offered.
