Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course will be able to demonstrate an understanding of:

- 1. the theoretical underpinnings of social research
- 2. the relationship between research and theory
- 3. a range of social research perspectives
- 4. research ethics
- 5. the principles of quantitative and qualitative research design
- 6. a range of quantitative and qualitative research methods
- 7. data analysis, interpretation and presentation.

Teaching format

Lectures

While attendance at lectures is not compulsory, students are expected to regularly attend them, and will be advantaged if they do so. The workshop slot on Tuesday 11.00 - 11.50 am will be used for discussion of lecture content, elaboration on assessment or the showing of films.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must submit the key concepts exercise, sit the in-class test and submit the exercise in analysis.

Workload

University guidelines stipulate that a 20-point course should require 200 hours over a trimester, including class time, of student work. Because this course is being taught over five weeks, students should be prepared to commit a large amount of time to the course over the five weeks.

This course is 100% internally assessed and requires three pieces of work (two exercises and one in-class test).

1. Exercise 1 (1000 words)

Due 25th November

Choose **5** key concepts from the list below and define this concept and describe how the concept applies to social and cultural research. Use up to 200 words for each concept and provide a complete bibliography.

Key concepts:

ontology, epistemology, methodology, triangulation, qualitative, quantitative, positivism, constructivism, interpretivism.

2. In-class test (50 minutes)

In-class 10th December

This test will cover all material included in lectures up until this date.

3. Exercise 2 (2000 words)

Due 17th December

This is an exercise using visual methodologies. You should choose an image or series of images relating to Christmas and critically analyse them using a concept or concepts that you have encountered in your social science courses. Your image(s) may come from the media or be photographs you have taken yourself. If they are photographs you have taken then they should be from a public space and not include identifiable people in them. More information on this exercise will be given in the lectures on visual methodologies and provided on Blackboard.

Submission and return of work

Both exercises must be submitted electronically through Turnitin by the due date. They will be marked and returned to you electronically. The test will be completed in class on the 10th December. It will be returned in class.

Instructions for Turnitin

Student work provided for assessment in this course will be checked for academic integrity by the electronic search engine <u>http://www.turnitin.com</u>. Turnitin is an online plagiarism prevention tool which compares submitted work with a very large database of existing material. Turnitin will retain a copy of submitted material on behalf of the University for detection of future plagiarism, but access to the full text of submissions is not made available to any other party.

The two exercises must be submitted to Turnitin. To use it, go to www.turnitin.com, click on 'create a user profile' in the upper right corner. After creating an account, you can log in with your ID and password as with an e-mail account. Use the class ID and enrolment password to enrol in "Course ID"
