PRESCRIPTION

A study of Western music approached through a series of modules, each centered on one exemplary composition, with an emphasis on the social and cultural context of music, rather than on analytical study of musical style.

- 1. identify and describe aspects of the Western music tradition, including musical works, historical contexts, and individuals
- 2. explain various social, political and cultural factors that influence the composition and performance of Western music

TEACHING FORMAT

This course comprises one 1-hour lecture and one 2-hour lecture per week and one 1-hour tutorial per week. During tutorials, a graduate tutor will guide students in discussion of course readings and/or set works, or assist with/give feedback on work in progress, where appropriate.

MANDATORY PAPER REQUIREMENTS

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- a) complete each item of assessment worth at least 10% specified for this course (subject to penalties for late submission of work)
- b) attend at least 80% of lectures and 80% of tutorials related to this course.

WORKLOAD

A 20-point one-trimester paper should require at least 200 hours work (including class time). This means that in term time, the midterm break and study week you should be prepared to spend on average 13 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments. Attendance at **lectures and tutorials** across the trimester comprises **47 hours** of work. In general, students should plan on spending an additional **5 hours per week during term time (so 60 hours) in basic class preparation**, which if done properly will also prepare you for the five Quizzes. The **2 short essays and the test should take up to a further 10 hours of preparation time each**. An additional **10 hours of listening and preparation** should be spent over the mid-term break; and the **final essay should require 50 hours** of work (including on the preparatory assignment).

ASSESSMENT

Approved assessment regime

The following assessment regime for this paper has been approved by the NZSM Academic Committee:

There are four items of assessment:

- 1. 5-10 short weekly quizzes. Related to learning outcomes 1 & 2 (30%).
- 2. 2 short essays (ca 750 words each), 15% each. Related to learning outcomes 1-3 (30%).
- 3. Test. Related to learning outcomes 1-3 (10%).
- 4. Final Essay. Related to learning outcomes 1-3 (30%).

Assignments must be submitted by the due dates. In fairness to other students, unless a medical certificate is produced, assessment submitted after 5pm on the due date will be subject to a 5% demerit on your grade, increasing by 5% each further working day it is overdue.
