PRESCRIPTION

A study of the major musical genres and centres of musical production of the eighteenth century in their intellectual and social context. 2014 Offering: A study of European music in the 18th century. This course offers a critique of the historiographical and philosophical frameworks for the study of music history in the 18th century. It examines the principal musical genres of the period and their relationship to social and cultural trends. Attention will be given to the emerging concept of the canon alongside a wider survey of significant repertoire and of prominent composers and their reception. The central importance of functional tonality in shaping formal procedures will be examined and students will become familiar with the dominant musical forms. Co-taught with MUSC 336.

PAPER LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students who have successfully completed this paper will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate an ability to critically investigate questions relevant to music of the 18th century and write about them with assurance
- 2. Analyse music of moderate complexity written within the period
- 3. Demonstrate knowledge of the key musical figures, principal musical genres and significant repertoire from the period
- 4. Relate musical developments in the 18th century to their social and philosophical contexts
- 5. Demonstrate an understanding of selected contemporary musicological perspectives on 18th century studies.

TEACHING FORMAT

This course comprises three hours per week of lectures (a one-hour lecture and a two-hour lecture) plus one 1-hour tutorial per week. During tutorials, a graduate tutor will guide students in discussion of course readings and/or set works, or assist with/give feedback on work in progress, where appropriate.

MANDATORY PAPER REQUIREMENTS

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- a) complete each item of assessment worth at least 10% specified for this course (subject to penalties for late submission of work)
- b) attend at least 80% of lectures and 80% of tutorials related to this course.

WORKLOAD

A 20-point one-trimester paper should require at least 200 hours work (including class time). Given that there will be 47 class hours, you should be spending a minimum of 10 hours per week during teaching weeks and the mid-trimester break reading for the course, listening to relevant recordings, preparing assignments and studying for the final examination.

ASSESSMENT

Approved assessment regime

The following assessment regime for this paper has been approved by the NZSM Academic Committee:

There are five items of assessment:

- 1. A portfolio of 8 10 journal assignments 300 words per week. Related to learning outcomes 1 5. (15%)
- 2. A bibliographic exercise 750 words. Related to learning outcome 1, 3, 4, 5. (10%)
- 3. An analytical exercise 750 words, plus annotated score. Related to learning outcomes 1 and 2. (15%)
- 4. Essay 2,000 words. Related to learning outcomes 1 5. (30%)
- 5. Final examination 3 hours. Related to learning outcomes 1 5 (30%).
