Prescription

Anthropologists hold a variety of epistemological and ontological perspectives that they articulate in their writing. This year we will concentrate on kinship given important recent work on the topic by Chapais, Godelier and Sahlins.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students passing this course should be able to:

1. understand the anthropological study of kinship,
2. evaluate recent thinking about kinship in anthropology, and
3. consider how various positions about kinship relate to wider concerns in social and cultural anthropology.

Teaching format

Each class will have a theme that the lecturer will speak to briefly. Students will then be asked to contribute ideas and points from their readings to the theme. The idea is to generate a discussion among the class about the topic being considered. It is important that each student keep up with the reading that will be assigned prior to the class.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

1. submit both essays, and
2. attend at least 85% of classes.

Workload

The expectations are that students will work 10 hours per point, therefore a 30-point course equates to 300 hours over the trimester. This includes scheduled class time, individual or group study, and work on assessment tasks. As a guideline, you should expect to work for 15 hours per week. This includes two hours for class meetings, with the rest of your time being devoted to reading and writing reviews for the discussions that will take place in the class and your essays.

Assessment

This course is internally assessed. Assessment will be based on two essays each about the work of one of the anthropologists you are reading about, or another topic that you will construct in consultation with me. The assignments will be discussed and designed with the students taking this class.

Extensions are possible if you are having serious difficulties in completing your work. You must talk to the course coordinator, Hal Levine, before the due date if you think you will need an extension. Please note that you might be asked for written justification, e.g., a medical certificate, death notice, or letter from a counsellor.

Penalties

Penalties will apply for lateness in presenting assignments. 5% will be deducted from the piece of work per day counting that piece of work as 100%. This penalty will only be waived by the presentation of a medical certificate or other evidence of incapacity.

Assessment work will not be accepted for marking or for receiving comments more than seven days after the due date or seven days after an approved extension date. To meet mandatory course requirements work must still be submitted.
