Communication of additional information

Prescription

An introduction to fundamental knowledge of common Western orchestral instruments, and notational issues specific to the study of composition and orchestration. Some knowledge of musical notation and music theory is required.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who successfully complete this course will be able to:

1. achieve good musical and technical understanding of common orchestral and jazz instruments

2. recall from memory, to an acceptable level, the ranges and registers of common orchestral and jazz instruments

3. demonstrate a strong understanding of idiomatic instrumental writing, following good notational practice

4. demonstrate awareness of specific performance problems in individual instruments

5. demonstrate understanding of common notational issues specific to individual instruments, as used in general composition and orchestration practice.

Teaching format

This course comprises one 2-hour lecture and one 1-hour lecture per week.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

a) complete each item of assessment worth at least 10%. Where the item contains multiple subcomponents (e.g., a portfolio of journal entries, or similar), students must complete at least 50% of those subcomponents

b) attend at least 80% of lectures and 80% of tutorials (if relevant) related to this course, unless absence is due to verified medical reasons, or advance permission for absence has been given by the lecturer.

Workload

A 15-point one-trimester course should require at least 150 hours' work (including class time). This means that during the trimester, the mid-trimester break and study week you should be prepared to spend, on average, 10 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments. The four class tests are completed during lectures, while the four minor assignments involve, on average, 2–3 hours' work.

Assessment

1. A portfolio of minor assignments. Related to learning objectives 1, 3–5. (50%)

2. A suite of in-class tests. Related to learning objectives 1, 2, 5. (50%)
