Prescription

An advanced course building on ITAL 216, designed to improve performance in speaking and writing, reading and oral comprehension. Lectures present written and audio-visual materials illustrating various aspects of Italy and help students learn advanced syntax, idiom and vocabulary. The tutorial and audio-visual classes support fluent oral skills and listening comprehension.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

The course learning objectives of ITAL 315 are broadly in line with levels upper B2-lower C1 of the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages.

Students who pass this course will be able to:

1. read and comprehend a variety of authentic Italian texts;
2. have a sufficient grasp of the main current affairs to read Italian newspapers with a reasonable degree of linguistic and contextual comprehension;
3. write with a good degree of grammatical accuracy and a wide range of standard vocabulary;
4. comprehend standard Italian spoken at normal speed;
5. speak on a variety of topics confidently, fluently and with a reasonably good pronunciation;
6. translate either from Italian into English with a reasonable level of accuracy and speed.

Teaching format

This course is delivered through two lectures, one tutorial and one audiovisual class per week. The lectures will mainly cover grammatical aspects of the Italian language and the development of written skills, such as written comprehension, translation of texts, and development of advanced written expression in general. The tutorials will focus on the development of oral linguistic skills and the audiovisual classes will aim to develop listening comprehension skills. Both the tutorials and the audiovisual classes will require students' active participation in group exercises or activities.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass of 50% students must:

- i. attend a minimum of 80% of the oral (tutorial) and audio-visual (AV) classes;
- ii. submit the 2 written assignments by the date indicated;
- iii. sit the 2 written tests on the dates indicated;
- iv. sit the 2 tutorial/AV tests on the dates indicated;
- v. submit 80% of the 10 weekly writing tasks
- vi. attend the oral presentation at the appointed time.

Workload

The University Assessment Handbook has laid down guidelines as to the number of hours per week which students are expected to devote to a course in order to maintain satisfactory progress. In order to maintain satisfactory progress in this **20-point 200 hour course**, students should expect to work on average 16 hours per week including contact hours - i.e., in the case of ITAL 315, **13 hours of private study outside class time**. Some students will find they need to do more than this, especially if they are aiming to achieve high grades. A possible distribution of this time each week would be:

In class time: 2 hours (weeks 1 and week 12); 4 hours (weeks 2-11)

Outside class time:

Reading and reviewing class notes 30% (about 3 hours)

Written, oral and aural practice 30% (about 3 hours)

Assessment preparation 40% (about 4 hours)

Submission and return of work

Tidy presentation of assignments is essential. Work may be typed or neatly handwritten. Crossings-out indicate that a piece of work is still at draft stage. Allow space for correction: leave a 4-centimetre margin and write on alternate lines. Do not write in pencil.

All assignments must include a cover sheet available from the School of Languages and Cultures (SLC) Office on the sixth floor of von Zedlitz (vZ610). Assignments are to be handed into the Italian assignment slot located to the left of the SLC Office (vZ610). Corrected work will be handed out in class. If you do not collect your work in class, you will be able to collect it from the SLC Office (VZ610) between the hours of 10am and 2pm each day. A Student ID card will need to be shown to collect work.

Extensions and penalties

Extensions

The due dates for the assignments given in the Course Programme *must* be adhered to. Extensions with no penalty will be considered on the grounds of exceptional personal circumstances, but the Course Coordinator should always be contacted on or before the due dates if there is a problem.

Penalties

The penalty for work presented late without prior approval is a *5% deduction per day*. In addition, please note that up to a *maximum of 5%* may be deducted for poorly presented assignments.
