# Prescription

Advanced-level study of both written and spoken Italian.

## **Course learning objectives (CLOs)**

ITAL 401 is a first-trimester 30-point advanced course for students in the Italian language. The course aims to further develop your skills in writing, reading, comprehension and oral expression through an in-depth study of the structures of language, broadly in line with the C2 of the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages ("a) can understand with ease virtually everything heard or read; b) can summarise information from different spoken and written sources, reconstructing arguments and accounts in a coherent presentation; c) can express him/herself spontaneously, very fluently and precisely, differentiating finer shades of meaning even in the most complex situations").

Students who pass this course will be able to:

- i. express themselves fluently and correctly in different registers in both oral and written Italian;
- ii. understand and use complex sentence structures in both written and spoken Italian;
- iii. translate confidently texts which require advanced language skills from and into Italian;
- iv. express themselves critically on a wide variety of topics in written Italian.

# **Teaching format**

This course is delivered through one two-hour lecture per week, in which a range of materials are covered using a wide variety of authentic texts and materials. Class activities include written and aural comprehension, reading, writing, translation, conversation and audio-visual activities in Italian. Students are expected to participate actively in each class.

## Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- 1. submit the 2 written assignments by the due dates (subjects to the provisions for late submission of work);
- 2. sit the 2 written and aural tests on the dates indicated in the course programme;
- 3. deliver the 2 oral presentations on dates agreed with the lecturer;
- 4. attend at least 80% of lectures.

#### Workload

Victoria University has laid down guidelines as to the number of hours per week which students are expected to devote to a course in order to maintain satisfactory progress. Students enrolling in a 30-point, 300-hour course should work on average 20 hours per week including contact hours- i.e., in the case of ITAL 401, 18 hours of private study outside class time. Some students will find they need to do more than this, especially if they are aiming to achieve high grades.

A possible distribution of study time each week would be:

Class attendance 2 hours
Reading and reviewing class notes 4 hours
Written, aural and aural practice 4 hours
Weekly homework 4 hours
Assessment preparation 4 hours

# Submission and return of work

Tidy presentation of assignments is essential. Work may be typed or neatly handwritten. Crossings-out indicate that a piece of work is still at draft stage. Allow space for correction: leave a 4-centimetre margin and double space or write on alternate lines. Do not write in pencil.

Students will be able to collect marked work from the SLC Office on the 6<sup>th</sup> floor of von Zedlitz between the hours of 10am and 2pm each day. A Student ID card will need to be shown to collect work. Coursework is generally returned within two weeks of submission. Uncollected work will be destroyed 3 months after the date of the final written test.

# **Extensions and penalties**

### **Extensions**

The due dates for the assignments given in the Course Programme *must* be adhered to. Extensions with no penalty will be considered on the grounds of exceptional personal circumstances, but the Course Coordinator should always be contacted on or before the due dates if there is a problem.

#### **Penalties**

Although work may be accepted late in special circumstances, the Course Coordinator should always be contacted on or before the due dates if there is a problem.

The penalty for work presented late without prior approval is a 5% deduction per day. In addition, please note that up to a maximum of 5% may be deducted for poorly presented assignments.

Please note that no work for assessment will be accepted after Friday, 12 June, 4pm.

The dates of the tests given in the Course Programme *must* be adhered to. You should always sit a test if humanly possible, obtaining a medical certificate if you wish to claim impairment. If you sit a test but believe your performance has been radically affected by some medical or other factor, inform the Course Coordinator *immediately*. If you fail the test, you may be able to claim impairment. If you are unable to sit a test, for severe medical, personal or family reasons, you should do everything possible to notify the Course Coordinator, if necessary through the Administrator, *before* the test, or to get a friend or family member to do so on your behalf.

Only in cases of severe illness or other exceptionally difficult circumstances, which must normally be documented, can the Programme consider allowing students to sit a test at a different time from that indicated.
