Prescription

This course examines various aspects of Japanese mythology derived from the earliest written sources and from oral traditions. Selected Japanese myths are outlined and devices of orality (pre-literary) tradition applied to them. Origins of Japanese mythology are explored in the context of prehistoric migrations and recent archaeological findings. Co-taught with JAPA 314.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1. demonstrate an upper-intermediate to low-advanced comprehension of academic writing in the Japanese language in the discipline of mythology;
- 2. read and critique related Japanese and English academic literature with the aid of dictionaries;
- 3. discuss in academic-style Japanese and English various topics related to Japanese mythology.

Teaching format

Taught by 2 hours of lectures and 1 hour of tutorial. In practice, due to the small class size, classes may be described as combined 'lectorials'. Students are expected to come to class having previously read the relevant handouts and should be prepared to read and discuss the content.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- 1. attend a minimum of 80% of the tutorial classes;
- 2. complete the two assignments by the due date, subject to the provisions for late submission of work;
- 3. sit the written tests on the date indicated
- 4. present one oral seminar presentation in Japanese.

Workload

Co-taught with JAPA 314, JAPA 412 students will be expected to study more extensive reading materials than JAPA 314 students; assessed work will be longer and more demanding; and an additional oral presentation to the class (leading a seminar) will be expected, to ensure that an Honours level of achievement is attained.

The University Assessment Handbook has laid down guidelines as to the number of hours per week which students are expected to devote to a course in order to maintain satisfactory progress. Students enrolling in a one-trimester 30-point course should work on average 20 hours per week including contact hours - i.e., in the case of JAPA 412, 17 hours of private study outside class time.
