Prescription

In this course typological characteristics of sentence structures are studied and analysed within the perspective of a theoretical model. Co-taught with LING 427.

Course content

A schedule of classes will be made available separately.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course should be able to

- 1. understand the basic concepts of X-bar theory and how the theory is applied to the analysis of sentence data,
- 2. apply the X-bar model in the analysis of sentence data from English and other languages,
- 3. understand the role of tree structures, and be able to apply them, in the modelling of semantic relations between items in sentences,
- form conclusions based on the analysis of sentence data from the perspective of a formal framework.

Teaching format

The course delivery is through the lectures and tutorials as listed under Class times and locations. Tutorials commence in the second week (beginning 9 March). Do not miss your first tutorial.

Students are expected to contribute to discussions in tutorials.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- 1. unless prevented through illness, etc., attend all weekly tutorial sessions
- 2. submit all assessment items by their final dates as specified with the individual assignments, subject to provisions for late submission of work.

Workload

You are expected to spend 200 hours on this course over the whole trimester, which means on average around 15 hours per week. There is a total of 42 class contact hours (lectures and tutorials) in the trimester. You should allow a minimum of 2 hours per week for preparation for classes and revision after classes (the latter to confirm your understanding of the lecture material) and background reading. The remaining hours should be spent on preparation of the items for assessment.

Assessment

Assessment will be based on the items listed below (note that there is no Final Examination):

All the assignments, except for Assignment 4, must be handed in by **10am** on the day due. Assignment 4 must be handed in by **4pm** on the day it is due.

Assignments should be handed in to the lecturer on the day the assignment is due or to the LALS Office (VZ 210). Please keep a back-up copy of your assignment.

Each Assignment includes one or more tasks in syntactic analysis based on data from English and/or other languages. The Assignments will be asking students to demonstrate familiarity with basic concepts in syntax covered in the course and to demonstrate that they are able to apply to data from different languages the techniques of analysis which will be taught and practised in the lectures and tutorials up to the time of the "due dates" for these pieces of work.

The maximum length for Assignment 1 is: 4 pages or 750 words; for Assignment 2: 10 pages or 1,250 words; for Assignment 3: 12 pages or 1,750 words: for Assignment 4: 20 pages or 2,750 words. Diagrams/figures/tables are included in the page/word counts and the page count is understood as applying to A4 double spaced pages.

Reasonable accommodation is made with respect to assessment procedures for students with disabilities (see also Where to find more detailed information below).

N.B. Note that if no work is submitted for assessment before the last three weeks of teaching, there will be nothing on which to base an aegrotat consideration. An aegrotat pass will normally be approved only when a candidate has completed at least 30% of the course assessment.

Submission and return of work

Assignments should be handed in to the lecturer on the day the assignment is due or to the LALS Office (VZ 210). Please keep a back-up copy of your assignment. You can expect that your work will be graded and returned to you by not more than two weeks after you submit it. Where more than one question is included on an assignment, specific marks will be assigned to the individual questions. The marking criteria accord with how well the work that is produced fulfils the instructions that are given with each assignment task.

Extensions and penalties

Extensions

In line with the Linguistics Programme policy, assignments handed in after the due date will receive a considerably reduced grade (see below) unless accompanied by a medical certificate or other evidence of exceptional circumstances. If you require an extension for good reasons, ask the course coordinator ahead of the date for handing in the assignment. Such an extension may be given only up to the point at which the Assignments are handed back.

Penalties

Assignments which are handed in after the time and date on which they are due will be subject to a scale of penalities involving a reduction in the grade they are given, the severity of the grade reduction corresponding to the severity of the lateness. The details of the penalties will be set out on each Assignment.

You are strongly advised to begin work early on your assignment to be sure of getting access to the appropriate books and articles, to avoid last-minute rush, and to ensure that your work is not needlessly penalised. If your work is handed in late, it may also be returned to you late.
