Prescription

The study of issues in the syntax of Oceanic languages.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

1. demonstrate understanding of issues in current syntactic theory that are brought out in the application of the theory to aspects of Oceanic languages
2. build up a description of resources pertaining to the syntax of a selected Oceanic language
3. complete a research project on a selected topic in the syntax of one or more Oceanic languages.

Teaching format

The course will be run as a directed reading course with weekly discussion sessions to which students are expected to contribute.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

1. attend all weekly discussion sessions (unless prevented by illness or an unforeseeable event)
2. submit all assessment items on time (unless an extension is granted).

Workload

You are expected to spend 300 hours on this course over the whole trimester, which means on average around 20 hours per week (Including the two weeks of the mid-trimester break). There is a total of 22 class contact hours in the trimester. You should allow a minimum of 3 hours per week for preparation for classes and revision after classes (the latter to confirm your understanding of the lecture material), background reading and assignment preparation. The remaining 240 hours plus should be spent on preparation of the items for assessment, with the proportion of time spent on each assessment item in proportion to the percentage of its contribution of the Final Grade.

Assessment

The Report will provide a description of distinguishing characteristics of the syntax/morphology of a selected Oceanic language. The Review will present an account of literature on a chosen topic on an aspect of the syntax of one or more Oceanic languages. The Research project will be on the syntax of one or more selected Oceanic languages using a presentation format appropriate to the discipline.

Submission and return of work

Assignments should be handed in to the lecturer on the day the assignment is due or to the LALS Office (VZ 210). Please keep a back-up copy of your assignment. You can expect that your work will be graded and returned to you in class by not more than two weeks after you submit it. Where more than one Question is included on an assignment, specific marks will be assigned to the individual questions.

Extensions and penalties

Extensions

In line with the Linguistics Programme policy, assignments handed in after the due date will receive a considerably reduced grade (see below) unless accompanied by a medical certificate or other evidence of exceptional circumstances. If you require an extension for good reasons, ask the course coordinator ahead of the date for handing in the assignment. Such an extension may be given only up to the point at which the Assignments are handed back.

Penalties

Assignments which are handed in after the time and date on which they are due will be subject to a scale of penalties involving a reduction in the grade they are given, the severity of the grade reduction corresponding to the severity of the lateness. The details of the penalties will be set out on each Assignment.

You are strongly advised to begin work early on your assignment to be sure of getting access to the appropriate books and articles, to avoid last-minute rush, and to ensure that your work is not needlessly penalised. If your work is handed in late, it may also be returned to you late.
