Prescription

Study of the basic elements and procedures of common practice tonal music, including basic training in harmony and counterpoint, aural perception, and keyboard skills.

Course content

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who have successfully completed this course will be able to:

- 1. add counterpoints in all five species to a given cantus firmus
- 2. harmonise a non-modulating melody for four-part choir using diatonic chords, including seventh chords, and secondary dominants
- 3. identify by ear the basic properties of intervals, chords, and keys, and compare simple performances with the written score
- 4. use the keyboard to play simple pieces, transpositions, score readings, and improvisations.

Teaching format

This course comprises three 1-hour lectures and one 1-hour Musicianship Lab per week. During Musicianship Labs, a graduate tutor will guide students in gaining keyboard and aural skills, and give feedback on work in progress, where appropriate. Students are expected to submit a short journal each week via Blackboard.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- a) complete each item of assessment worth at least 10%. Where the item contains multiple subcomponents (e.g., a portfolio of journal entries, or similar), students must complete at least 50% of those subcomponents
- b) attend at least 80% of lectures, tutorials and workshops related to this course, unless absence is due to verified medical reasons, or advance permission for absence has been given by the teacher/lecturer

c) achieve at least 40% of the available marks in each of Counterpoint, Harmony, Aural and Keyboard.

Workload

Theory:

Over the course of the trimester you should expect to spend 60% of your non-class time (92 hours) on reading the class notes and other suggested material, completing Fragments and Assignments, and revising for tests. Fragments are intended to give you feedback on your understanding of the material before embarking on the related assignment, and tests assess your overall understanding of the subject. Since the items of assessment in theory are interdependent, the share of the allocated workload time spent on individual items will depend on the challenge that each presents to different students.

Keyboard and Aural:

You should expect to spend four hours per week working on Keyboard and Aural skills outside the scheduled Musicianship Lab times.

Journals:

You should expect to spend one and one quarter hours on each of the first eight journal entries, and five hours on the final entry, which is intended as a summary of the previous eight.

A 20-point one-trimester course should require at least 200 hours' work (including class time). This means that during the trimester, the mid-trimester break and study week you should be prepared to spend, on average, 13 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments.

Assessment

General marking criteria are provided on a separate sheet. Criteria specific to particular assignments will be provided on Blackboard with that assignment.

Approved assessment regime

The following assessment regime has been approved by the NZSM Academic Committee:

There are 6 items of assessment:

- 1. 5–15 Short Harmony Assignments. Related to learning objectives 1 & 2. (15%)
- 2. 5–15 Short Counterpoint Assignments. Related to learning objectives 1 & 2. (15%)
- 3. Two tests each in Harmony and Counterpoint. Related to learning objectives 1 & 2. (30%)
- 4. Two Aural Tests. Related to learning objective 3. (15%)
- 5. Two Keyboard Tests. Related to learning objective 4. (15%)
- 6. A Journal of responses to class material. Related to learning objectives 1, 2, 3, and 4. (10%)
