Prescription

Development of theoretical knowledge and skills for improvisation, composition, transcription, transposition and analysis to an advanced standard.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who have successfully completed this course will be able to:

- 1. demonstrate an understanding of advanced jazz harmony, form, melodic construction, reharmonisation and non-functional tonality through analysis
- 2. demonstrate a thorough knowledge of jazz aural skills, including intervals, chord and scale/mode qualities (including altered dominant qualities), and chord progressions
- 3. demonstrate knowledge of, and basic skills in, jazz composition.

Teaching format

This course comprises two 1.5-hour lectures per week.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- a) complete each item of assessment worth at least 10%. Where the item contains multiple subcomponents (e.g., a portfolio of journal entries, or similar), students must complete at least 50% of those subcomponents
- b) attend at least 80% of lectures and 80% of tutorials (if relevant) related to this course, unless absence is due to verified medical reasons, or advance permission for absence has been given by the teacher/lecturer.

Workload

A 20-point one-trimester course should require at least 200 hours' work (including class time). This means that during the trimester, the mid-trimester break and study week you should be prepared to spend, on average, 13 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments.

Assessment

- 1. Test (including aural skills). Related to learning objectives 1 & 2. (25%)
- 2. Final Examination (including aural skills). Related to learning objectives 1 & 2. (30%)
- 3. A suite of 5–8 minor assignments. Related to learning objectives 1–3. (45%)
