## **Prescription**

A critical examination of the development of popular music from the 1950s to the present, investigating diverse genres, the musical techniques employed to achieve the desired outcomes, and the cultural contexts in which the music is created, and the types of scholarly research and methodologies adopted (and in development) for the analysis of such genres. Co-taught with MUSC 248.

## Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who successfully complete this course should be able to:

- 1. describe and exemplify popular music from the second half of the 20th century until today
- 2. understand the structures of popular music, and how they continue to develop through the mixing of genres that create new styles
- 3. critically define and discuss the major issues around the production and consumption of popular music
- 4. conduct independent research that incorporates and expands upon points 1 to 3.

## **Teaching format**

This course comprises one 1-hour lecture and one 2-hour lecture per week.

# Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- a) complete each item of assessment worth at least 10%. Where the item contains multiple subcomponents (e.g., a portfolio of journal entries, or similar), students must complete at least 50% of those subcomponents
- b) attend at least 80% of lectures and 80% of tutorials (if relevant) related to this course, unless absence is due to verified medical reasons, or advance permission for absence has been given by the lecturer
- c) attend at least one Music Forum seminar presentation in the trimester the course is taught.

#### Workload

A 20-point one-trimester course should require at least 200 hours' work (including class time). This means that during the trimester, the mid-trimester break and study week you should be prepared to spend, on average, 13 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments.

Specific workload demands will change from week to week, based on the assessment schedule. However, as a general rule, each week you should plan to devote five to six hours to assigned reading and listening, two to three hours preparing written work, and one to two hours reviewing previous materials, and preparing for tests and examinations.

#### **Assessment**

#### Approved assessment regime

The following assessment regime has been approved by the NZSM Academic Committee:

There are 5 items of assessment:

- 1. Portfolio of written assignments, totalling 3,500 words. Related to learning objectives 2, 3. (20%)
- 2. Two In-Class Tests. Related to learning objectives 1, 2. (30%)
- 3. Short essay, 750–1,000 words. Related to learning objectives 2, 4. (15%)
- 4. Final essay project, 2,500–3,000 words. Related to learning objectives 1, 2, 3. (25%)
- 5. In-class research presentation. Related to learning objective 4. (10%)
