# Prescription

Advanced concepts and techniques in the arrangement of existing music for instrumental ensembles, with an emphasis on arranging for large and/or unusual combinations of instruments.

1. identify how principles of orchestration support the musical structure of an existing piece of music

2. demonstrate the ability to take a creative and imaginative approach to arrangement

3. apply skills gained from undergraduate orchestration courses to more advanced orchestration projects

4. demonstrate an understanding of contemporary orchestration techniques

5. manage a self-directed orchestration project.

# **Teaching format**

This course comprises one 1-hour lecture and one 2-hour lecture per week. These lectures will include lecture presentations, close analysis of scores and student projects, and work-in-progress sessions to assist students in the development and completion of projects. Final projects will be read by the NZSM Orchestra (date TBA).

## Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

a) complete each item of assessment worth at least 10%. Where the item contains multiple subcomponents (e.g., a portfolio of journal entries, or similar), students must complete at least 50% of those subcomponents

b) attend at least 80% of lectures and 80% of tutorials (if relevant) related to this course, unless absence is due to verified medical reasons, or advance permission for absence has been given by the lecturer

c) attend at least 80% of instrumental/ensemble workshops and readings related to this course, unless absence is due to verified medical reasons, or advance permission for absence has been given by the lecturer.

## Workload

A 30-point one-trimester course should require at least 300 hours' work (including class time). This means that during the trimester, the mid-trimester break and study week you should be prepared to spend, on average, 20 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments.

# Assessment

#### Approved assessment regime

The following assessment regime has been approved by the NZSM Academic Committee:

There are 4 items of assessment:

1. Two major assignments for large ensemble, including scores and parts (2–4 minutes each). Related to learning objectives 2–5 (50%)

2. One assignment for chamber ensemble, including scores and parts (2–4 minutes). Related to learning objectives 2–5 (20%)

3. Orchestration analysis (2000 words). Related to learning objective 1 (15%)

4. Classwork & minor assignments. Related to learning objectives 1-4 (15%)
