Prescription

Advanced study of a selected topic within jazz studies.

2015 Offering: Jazz in New Zealand since 1980. An advanced course that critically examines jazz music in New Zealand since 1980, and attendant scholarly and biographical literature. Jazz emerged more than 100 years ago in the United States, subsequently spreading across the world. As it became established in different countries, it appears to have assumed many unique regional dialects. This course explores the 'local accent' jazz has acquired in New Zealand over the past 35 years.

Co-taught with MUSC 326.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who successfully complete this course will be able to:

1. identify and explain, at an advanced level, key ideas and individuals in a selected area of jazz
2. evaluate, at an advanced level, a range of critical issues in jazz history and culture
3. generate advanced creative and/or critical work that engages with the selected area of jazz studied.

Teaching format

This course comprises one 2-hour lecture and one 1-hour lecture per week.

Students are expected to complete the prescribed reading and listening **before** coming to classes. This provides context for the principles discussed in lessons, and also enables students to contribute to class discussions. Most course materials (including listening assignments and set reading) will be available through Blackboard.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- a) complete each item of assessment worth at least 10%. Where the item contains multiple subcomponents (e.g., a portfolio of journal entries, or similar), students must complete at least 50% of those subcomponents
- b) attend at least 80% of lectures and 80% of tutorials (if relevant) related to this course, unless absence is due to verified medical reasons, or advance permission for absence has been given by the teacher/lecturer
- c) attend at least two Music Forum seminar presentations in the trimester the course is taught.

Workload

A 30-point one-trimester course should require at least 300 hours' work (including class time). This means that during the trimester, the mid-trimester break and study week you should be prepared to spend, on average, 20 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading,

listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments. In addition to the three hours spent in classes, to make the most of this course you will need to spend 4–5 hours reading, 4–5 hours listening to recordings, and up to 8 hours working on journals, assignments and test preparation.

Assessment

Approved assessment regime

The following assessment regime has been approved by the NZSM Academic Committee:

There are five items of assessment:

1. *Portfolio of 8–10 journal entries (500-600 words each). Related to Learning Objectives 1, 2, 3 (30%)*
2. *Analysis (c. 2,000 words with musical examples). Related to Learning Objectives 1, 2, 3 (15%)*
3. *Short writing assignment (c. 1,500 words). Related to Learning Objectives 1, 2, 3 (10%)*
4. *Class presentation. Related to Learning Objectives 1 & 2 (10%)*
5. *Final project (including preparatory work), (c. 5,000 words). Related to Learning Objectives 1, 2, 3 (35%)*
