Prescription

Development of practical skills for Latin jazz ensemble playing, and of knowledge of Latin jazz repertoire.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who have successfully completed this course will be able to:

- 1. perform in Latin jazz styles to an intermediate level
- 2. perform from memory selected tunes from the standard Latin jazz repertoire
- 3. show understanding of the idiosyncratic features of Latin jazz
- 4. transcribe and score all instrumental parts of a Latin jazz performance to an intermediate level.

Teaching format

This course comprises two 1.5 hr combos per week.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

a) complete each item of assessment worth at least 10%. Where the item contains multiple subcomponents (e.g. a portfolio of journal entries, or similar), students must complete at least 50% of those subcomponents

b) attend at least 80% of rehearsals unless absence is due to verified medical reasons or advance permission for absence has been given by the teacher/lecturer

c) organise a substitute player for every absence from a rehearsal. If a substitute is not organised, 5% will be deducted from the final year's mark for each absence which is not covered or pre-approved.

Workload

A 15-point one-trimester course should require at least 150 hours work (including class time). This means that in term time, the midterm break and study week you should be prepared to spend on average 10 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments.

Assessment

Approved assessment regime

The following assessment regime has been approved by the NZSM Academic Committee:

There are 2 items of assessment:

- 1. Two transcriptions. Related to learning outcomes 3 and 4. (40%)
- 2. Final performance. Related to learning outcomes 1, 2 and 3. (60%)
