Course prescription

This course examines several topics relating to moral, political, and aesthetic value.

Course content

The course is taught over two trimesters, with certain weeks set aside for students to focus on their coursework. It is split into three modules taught by three lecturers: Simon Keller, Nicholas Agar, and Richard Joyce (in that order).

Simon Keller will be teaching Serene J. Khader's *Adaptive Preferences and Women's Empowerment* (OUP, 2011).

Nick Agar will be teaching Nick Bostrom's *Superintelligence: Paths, Dangers, Strategies* (OUP, 2014).

Richard Joyce will be teaching Terence Cuneo's *Speech and Morality: On the Metaethical Implications of Speaking* (OUP, 2014).

A quick google search should reveal more information on each of these books. All three books are available on-line in their entirety through VUW library's catalogue. More detailed information about the course content will be given in the first class of each module.

Learning objectives

Students passing the course should be able to:

1. Advance their knowledge of several key areas of value theory.
2. Demonstrate their abilities to undertake logical and critical thinking, especially as it pertains to value theory.
3. Practice and improve their critical writing skills.

Graduate attributes

As with all Philosophy courses, learning objectives of this course contribute to the attainment of specific attributes in the areas of logical and critical thinking, conceptual analysis and rational and ethical decision-making. For more details please consult our website:

Teaching format

This course will involve one seminar per week in the first and second trimesters. Seminars will run for one hour and fifty minutes. The weekly meetings will include lecturing and discussion. Students are expected to attend all classes, take part in class discussion, and keep up with the reading.

Workload

In accordance with the Faculty Guidelines, this course has been constructed on the assumption that students will devote a total of 300 hours to PHIL 404, including two hours of seminars per fortnight. Over the 24 teaching weeks of the academic year, that is an average of 12.5 hours per week. This includes weekly attendance at lectures and tutorials and revision for and completion of all set assessment tasks. The University's Assessment Handbook stipulates that course outlines should "specify the average time that is notionally assigned to the completion of each assessment task." Notional assignments of completion times appear below (which excludes the times required for attendance at seminars, reading for class and preparation for presentations):

PHIL 404 is assessed on the basis of three essays. Each essay is worth 1/3 of the final grade.

These essays will assess your knowledge of the material covered in class and in readings, your capacity to select and develop a viable writing project, your ability to undertake independent research and develop independent ideas, and your skills at critically analysing philosophical arguments relevant to your chosen topics.

Submission of work

All essays must be submitted in two ways. A copy of the essay must first be submitted digitally via Blackboard. Make sure you save your file as a Microsoft Word document. The title of your file should have the following format: last name, underscore, first name, underscore, essay number, dot, doc/docx (for example: smith_mary_5.docx). Please also ensure that pages are numbered. A hard copy of the essay must then be submitted to one of the school administrators located in MY518.

Comments will be either posted on Blackboard or returned with the hard copy of the essay. (In the latter case, students can collect their essays from MY518 between the hours of 2.00 and 3.00 pm from Monday to Friday and must show their Student ID card.) Grades will be posted on Blackboard.

Extensions and Penalties

- All extensions must be obtained directly from the course coordinator, Richard Joyce.
- Late submission of assessment tasks will not get a grade higher than a C- unless the student contacts the course coordinator as soon as practically possible to explain the lateness (preferably before the assessment task is due to be submitted). The circumstances under which an extension

will be considered are outlined in section 3.2.1 of the Assessment Handbook.
