Course prescription

This course is divided into three sections. Each section will be run by a different lecturer on material related to their current research interests. In this way students can gain a knowledge and appreciation of the most current and cutting edge problems in philosophy.

Course content

The course is taught over two trimesters, with certain weeks set aside for students to focus on their coursework. It is split into three modules taught by three lecturers: Justin Sytsma, Sondra Bacharach, and Nicholas Agar (in that order).

Justin Sytsma will be teaching Jim Tabery, *Beyond Versus: The Struggle to Understand the Interaction of Nature and Nurture* (MIT Press, 2014).

Sondra Bacharach will be teaching one of Christy Mag Uidhir, *Art and Art-Attempts* (OUP, 2013) or Dominic Lopes, *Beyond Art* (OUP, 2014). Sondra will decide which to teach in consultation with the class.

Nicholas Agar will be teaching his own book *The Sceptical Optimist: Why technology isn't the answer to everything* (OUP, 2015).

A quick google search should reveal more information on each of these books. They should be available on-line in their entirety through Victoria University library's catalogue. More detailed information about the course content will be given in the first class of each module.

Learning objectives

Students passing the course should be able to:

- 1. advance their knowledge of several key areas of contemporary philosophy
- 2. demonstrate their abilities to undertake logical and critical thinking, especially as it pertains to contemporary debates in philosophy.
- 3. practise and improve their critical writing skills.

Teaching format

This course will involve one seminar per week during teaching time. Seminars will run for one hour and fifty minutes. The weekly meetings will include lecturing and discussion. Students are expected to attend all classes, take part in class discussion, and keep up with the reading.

Workload

In accordance with the University Guidelines, this course has been constructed on the assumption that students will devote a total of 300 hours to PHIL 409, including 36 hours of seminars. This includes weekly attendance at seminars and revision for, and completion of all, set assessment tasks. The University's Assessment Handbook stipulates that course outlines should "specify the average time that is notionally assigned to the completion of each assessment task." Notional assignments of completion times appear below (which excludes the times required for attendance at seminars, reading for class and preparation for presentations):

PHIL 409 is assessed on the basis of three essays. Each essay is worth 1/3 of the final grade.

These essays will assess your knowledge of the material covered in class and in readings, your capacity to select and develop a viable writing project, your ability to undertake independent research and develop independent ideas, and your skills at critically analyzing philosophical arguments relevant to your chosen topics.

Submission of work

All essays must be submitted in two ways. A copy of the essay must first be submitted digitally via Blackboard. Make sure you save your file as a Microsoft Word document. The title of your file should have the following format: last name, underscore, first name, underscore, essay number, dot, doc/docx (for example: smith_john_5.docx). Please also ensure that pages are numbered. A hard copy of the essay must then be submitted to one of the school administrators located in MY518. Indicative grades and comments will be posted on Blackboard.

Extensions and Penalties

• Late submission of assessment tasks will not get a grade higher than a C- unless the student makes an appointment as soon as practically possible with the course coordinator to explain the lateness (preferably before the assessment task is due to be submitted). The circumstances under which an extension will be considered are outlined in section 3.2.1 of the Assessment Handbook.
