# Prescription

This course studies aspects of the relationship between politics and society, concentrating principally on the influence of politics on the arts and the arts on politics. Other aspects of the relationship between politics and society will also be considered, including the influence of politics on sport and sport on politics.

# **Course learning objectives (CLOs)**

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1. describe the relationship between politics and society
- 2. analyse the influence of the arts on political ideas and behaviour
- 3. critique the effect of politics on the arts
- 4. theorise on the impact of politics on sport and of sport on politics
- 5. write well-organised, well-written, well-researched essays on the theme of politics and society.

# **Teaching format**

The course has one lecture per week. The lecture is scheduled for two hours, and will include a lecture presentation (the first hour) and class discussions (the second hour). There will also be a separate one-hour workshop session for discussion and essay preparation purposes.

#### Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- submit two research essays
- complete the final examination.

# Workload

In accordance with the University Guidelines, this course has been constructed on the assumption that students will devote a total of approximately **200** hours to this course, including three hours of class meetings per week (i.e., a two-hour lecture class and a one-hour workshop). This includes:

Lecture / discussion preparation and attendance at class meetings: 72 hours Research essay (#1): 47 hours Research essay (#2): 47 hours Final examination preparation and attendance: 34 hours

The first **research essay**, worth 30%, is due on **20 April** and is approximately 2000 words. The second research essay, worth 30%, is due on **2 June**. The focus of each essay assignment will be provided by the course coordinator.

A three-hour **final examination**, worth 40%, will cover topics considered in lectures and discussions, and in the course readings.

### Submission and return of work

Research essays should be submitted through the office essay drop-off point, Murphy Room 518, together with completed cover sheet which is available from the office. Essays must also be submitted to Professor Levine by email (as a Word attachment).

# **Extensions and penalties**

Students will be penalised for late submission of written work – a deduction of 5% for the first day late, and 2% per day thereafter, up to a maximum of 8 days. Work that is more than 8 days late can be accepted for mandatory course requirements but will not be marked. However, penalties may be waived if there are valid grounds (for example, illness [presentation of a medical certificate will be necessary] or similar other contingencies). In all such cases, prior information will be necessary.

#### Set texts

There is no required set text. A list of readings will be made available at the outset of the course.

# **Recommended reading**

There are many readings relating to politics and the arts (and political ideas in the work of individual artists). Likewise, there are many readings relating to politics and sport. There are also topical issues arising out of particular events (such as the release of a politically controversial film or the hosting of an international sports competition). Students are encouraged to read more widely on topics of personal interest to them relating to politics, sports and the arts.

#### **Class representative**
