Prescription

This course presents literary works, studied in their original Spanish, produced by Latin American writers in the twentieth century. As well as setting the texts within the socio-political context of contemporary Latin America, this course will introduce students to relevant themes in contemporary cultural criticism.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course will be able to:

- 1. analyse and evaluate the cultural works studied in the light of theories of Domestication and Transculturation;
- 2. examine and interpret these texts in spoken and written analysis;
- 3. synthesise a knowledge of selected aspects of political and social history of twentieth-century Latin America in relation to these works and theories.

Teaching format

This course is delivered through two lectures and one tutorial per week.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- 1. give the seminar presentation on the date scheduled;
- 2. complete the two essays by the due dates (subject to such provisions stated for late submission of work);
- 3. sit the final exam on the scheduled date.

Workload

The University Assessment Handbook has laid down guidelines as to the number of hours per week which students are expected to devote to a course in order to maintain satisfactory progress. Students enrolling in a one-trimester 20-point, 200-hour course should work on average 14 hours per week including contact

hours- i.e., in the case of SPAN 313, **11 hours of private study outside class time**. Some students will find they need to do more than this, especially if they are aiming to achieve high grades. A possible distribution of study time each week would be:

The relevant dates for the pieces of assessed work are detailed in the Course Programme. All of the pieces of assessment for SPAN 313 relate to all three of the course objectives.

Marking criteria for each piece of assessment will be communicated in class and on Blackboard.

Submission and return of work

All assignments must include a cover sheet provided or available from the SLC Office. Assignments are to be handed in to the Spanish and Latin American Studies Programme assignment slot located to the left of the SLC Office on the 6th floor of von Zedlitz.

Students will be able to collect marked work from the SLC Office on the 6th floor of von Zedlitz between the hours of 10am and 2pm each day. A Student ID card will need to be shown to collect work. Coursework is generally returned within two weeks of submission. Uncollected work will be destroyed 3 months after the date of the final written test.

Presentation of assignments

Tidy presentation of assignments is essential. Work may be typed or neatly handwritten. Crossings-out indicate that a piece of work is still at draft stage. Allow space for corrections: leave a 4-centimetre margin and write on alternate lines or double space if typing. Do not write in pencil.

Extensions and penalties

Extensions

Short extensions may be granted by the Course Coordinator for particular assignments if requested in writing prior to the hand-in date. Longer extensions will require appropriate supporting documentation. **Penalties**

The due dates for the assignments given in the Course Programme must be adhered to. Although work may be accepted late in special circumstances, the Course Coordinator should always be contacted on or before the due dates if there is a problem. The penalty for work presented late without prior approval is a 5% deduction per day. In addition, please note that up to a maximum of 5% may be deducted for poorly presented assignments.

Please note that, with the exception of the final exam, no work for assessment will be accepted after 19 June 2015.

Tests and impairments

The dates of the tests given in the Course Programme must be adhered to. You should always sit a test if possible, obtaining a medical certificate if you wish to claim impairment. If you sit the test but believe

your performance has been radically affected by some medical or other factors, inform the Course Coordinator immediately. If you fail the test, you may be able to claim impairment.

If it is quite impossible to sit a test, for severe medical, personal or family reasons, you should do everything possible to notify the Course Coordinator, if necessary through an Administrator, before the test, or to get a friend or family member to do so on your behalf. Only in cases of severe illness or other exceptionally difficult circumstances, which must normally be documented, can the Programme consider allowing students to sit a test at a different time from that indicated.
