Prescription

A workshop course in writing poetry which also involves wide reading in the genre.

Course content

This course is based around group workshopping of students' poems. Some of these poems will be written as responses to writing exercises and some written independently, towards the final folio requirement.

Through both reading and writing poetry, students will learn a variety of poetic features and technical approaches. CREW 253 will enable students to focus on their own writing. They will also become familiar with contemporary New Zealand and international poetry. They will develop their skills as both readers and writers of poetry, with a stronger sense of its possibilities both on and off the page.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- Write poetry of a standard comparable with poems being published in contemporary New Zealand literary magazines
- Read contemporary poetry with a critical eye, such that they are able to identify particular features they like and dislike, and identify/produce similar features within their own poems.
- Read poetry aloud in a clear, confident way

Teaching format

In the first half of the trimester there will be weekly exercise work. Students will have a week to complete each exercise and will present their work for group discussion. Exercises may focus on such topics as specific poetic forms and aspects of technique, and such sub-genres as 'list', 'prose' or 'found' poems. Discussion of contemporary poetry will be a part of each weekly session. In the second half of the trimester students will present their own work-in-progress folio to the class for discussion. Students are also required to provide at least one page of written feedback on each class member's work-in-progress folio by the following week's workshop.

Mandatory course requirements

In CREW 253 students must attend all workshops (except in extenuating circumstances) and complete all the prescribed exercise work and written feedback on the other students' work-in-progress folio on time. If students do not meet these requirements, their folio may not be assessed and they may automatically fail the course.

Any student who is concerned that they have been (or might be) unable to meet any of the MCRs because of exceptional personal circumstances, should contact the course coordinator as soon as possible.

Workload

CREW 253 is a 20 point undergraduate course. Students should expect to spend at least 200 hours on this course over the trimester, which amounts to about 15 hours per week, made up of 3 hours of workshop time, 2 hours of reading and about 10 hours of writing.

It is suggested that students, if possible, attend poetry readings while on the course, including those in the IIML's Writers on Mondays series (12.15pm each Monday from mid-July usually at Te Papa on The Marae, Level 4).

One-on-one meetings

In addition to the workshops, Hinemoana will meet with each student once during the trimester to discuss their folio content. The time for this will be arranged during the course.

Assessment

Assessment for the course CREW 253 will be based on a portfolio of original poetry submitted at the end of the course. TWO typewritten or printed copies of each student's folio must be submitted by **Thursday 29 October 2015**. Two examiners (the workshop convenor and one external assessor) will evaluate each folio. After assessment is completed, one copy of the portfolio will be returned to the student along with reports from the two assessors.

The folio: CREW 253 folios must comprise a minimum of twelve and a maximum of twenty poems produced during the course. Poems written prior to the workshop (including those which may have been submitted in students' original course application) may only be included if they have been substantially revised. Folios should be 'shaped' into something approximating a small volume of poetry.

Note: CREW 253 is assessed on a pass/fail basis only. Students who pass the course will receive Grade P (Ungraded Pass).

Submission and return of work

The final folio should be submitted on **29 October 2015** either at a pre-arranged function, or placed in Hinemoana Baker's pigeonhole in Room 402, 16 Waiteata Road.

Materials and equipment and/or additional expenses

Students will need to bring **thirteen** copies of each weekly exercise, and thirteen copies of the work they present in their folio session for distribution around the class. The work should be typewritten or printed from a computer. The photocopying is an additional expense for the student.

Set texts

There is one text for this course: an anthology of poems, which must be purchased from vicbooks (www.vicbooks.co.nz) prior to commencement of the course. The set text will often be referred to, so students will need to bring it to each workshop.

Class representative
