COMMUNICATION OF ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Course related information will be communicated via the FILM 305 Blackboard site, as well as at the start of lectures and in tutorials. PRESCRIPTION

This course examines the relationships between cinema and other media in a variety of contexts. Topics may include analogue and/or digital technologies, animation, 3D, and/or multiple platforms. In 2015 it will focus on the convergence of cinema and the technological apparatus of modern warfare. FILM 305 will explore a number of militarised applications of the cinematic technique, including drones, video games, propaganda films, and training videos. The course will include both a weekly film screening and a lecture.

COURSE LEARNING OBJECTIVES (CLOS)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1. Explain the convergence of cinema, technology, and warfare.
- 2. Demonstrate enhanced critical skills, including the ability to summarise and critique scholarly texts.
- 3. Employ textual analysis and research skills in the study of films and other war-media.
- 4. Communicate ideas and arguments in a scholarly manner.
- 5. Display evidence of practical and/or creative skills.

TEACHING FORMAT

This course will consist of two weekly lecture and screening sessions. Films will be screened on Mondays, in advance of the Tuesday lecture. Students are also required to attend tutorials, which begin in Week 2.

WORKLOAD

The expected workload for a 20 point course is 200 hours over the trimester. In addition to spending around 6 hours per week attending lectures, screenings and tutorials, you should spend approximately 5 hours each week on reading, preparing for tutorials, and reflecting on lectures. The remaining time should be spent working on assignments. The exact times spent on such activities will vary depending on your personal needs. Preparation for assignments should take place a number of weeks in advance of the due dates.

ASSIGNMENT #1: Reading Analysis (800 – 1,000 words) due 5pm Monday 3 August.

Write a critical summary of the set readings for week two, which consist of excerpts from Paul Virilio's *War and Cinema*.

ASSIGNMENT #2: due 5pm Friday 21 August.

Option A: Mashup Video (min. 2 minutes) + Reflection (min. 500 words).

Assemble a mashup video exhibiting the use of a cinematic weapon. This short video is to be accompanied by a written critical reflection outlining the implications of the convergence of war and the cinematic apparatus depicted in your video.

Option B: Close Analysis (min. 1200 words).

Write a close analysis (in essay form) of a documentary or feature film that exemplifies the convergence of war and the cinematic apparatus.

ASSIGNMENT #3: Comparative Analysis (min. 1,500 words) due 5pm Friday 9 October.

Write a comparative analysis (in essay form) of two examples of "counter-cinema" filmmaking.

ASSIGNMENT #4: Research Essay (min. 2,500 words) due 5pm Tuesday 27 October.

Write a research essay on an approved topic that engages with any of the themes covered in the course.

All written assignments for FILM 305 must be properly referenced. The preferred referencing style for Film 305 is MLA. See the SEFTMS Student Handbook for MLA specific referencing guidelines.
