## **Prescription**

This course aims to provide students with an insight into the many and varied international security challenges of the 21st Century.

## **Course learning objectives (CLOs)**

Students passing the course should be able to:

- demonstrate a critical understanding of some of the major theoretical frameworks in security studies
- 2. demonstrate empirical knowledge of events, circumstances, and strategies that are referenced by debates in the discipline
- 3. use terminology, theory and concepts introduced in the course to interpret contemporary international issues and events.

## **Teaching format**

The course is taught via a weekly 50 minute lecture and a weekly 1 hour 50 minute lecture. Lectures will be inclusive and involve group and class discussion. Class discussion will largely be based on the required readings. Students are expected to contribute to discussions and to have completed the required reading for every session.

#### Workload

In accordance with University Guidelines, this course has been constructed on the assumption that students will devote 200 hours to INTP 376 throughout the trimester. This includes weekly attendance at lectures (24 hours), preparation for lectures including completion of all set weekly readings (48 hours), and research and writing for set assessment tasks: it is expected that students will spend approximately 12 hours on the briefing paper, 48 hours on the essay, and 60 hours preparing for and sitting the examination.

#### **Briefing paper**

The topic of the briefing paper will be provided in week 2 of the course and will be due on Thursday 6 August. The briefing paper will test students' writing and analytical skills as well as their understanding and ability to apply the theoretical frameworks outlined in the course (learning objective 1).

#### **Essay**

The essay is designed to test students' ability to conduct in-depth research and analysis on a particular topic in International Security and to develop their writing skills. It will also test their knowledge of the theoretical frameworks, their empirical knowledge of some of the security issues covered in the course, and their ability to interpret security issues from difference conceptual standpoints (learning objectives 1-3). The essay is due on Friday 11 September.

#### **Final Examination**

The final examination will take the form of three one-hour questions. The examination will take place between 23 October to 14 November 2015. Students must be able to attend an examination at the University at any time during the scheduled examination period. The examination will test students' theoretical and empirical knowledge, and their ability to apply theories and concepts to international security issues (learning objectives 1-3).

## Submission and return of work

All work submitted for assessment must be dropped off in HARD COPY at the School Office (MY518) in the slots provided with an essay cover sheet. We reserve the right to ask for an electronic copy of any assessable work for checking in Turnitin.com (see <a href="https://www.cad.vuw.ac.nz/wiki/index.php/Turnitin">www.cad.vuw.ac.nz/wiki/index.php/Turnitin</a>)

Graded work will be returned to you in lectures in the first instance, and then returned to the School Office, MY 518, where they can be collected between the hours of 2.00-3.00 pm, Monday to Friday. We will notify students via Blackboard when graded essays are available (generally between 2-3 weeks after the date submitted).

## **Extensions and penalties**

#### **Extensions**

Late submission of **assignments** will **not be accepted** unless the student makes an appointment as soon as practically possible with the course coordinator to explain the lateness (preferably before the assignment is due to be submitted). #### **Penalties**

Students will be penalised for late submission of assignments – a deduction of 5% for the first day late, and 2% per day thereafter, up to a maximum of 8 days.
