Course prescription

This course offers an in-depth reading of *Inferno*, the first part of Dante's Divine Comedy and a masterpiece of world literature. The work is presented in relation to its medieval context, the politics of the time, the many references to Christianity and Classical culture, the development of Italian poetry and language. In the seminars students have the opportunity to discuss ideas of love, sin, good and evil, and how they have changed from Dante's times to the present day.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course will be able to:

- 1. show a general knowledge of Dante's life, works and times; demonstrate a good knowledge of Dante's *Inferno*;
- 2. translate into English passages selected from the set cantos; paraphrase from medieval Italian into modern Italian passages from the set cantos;
- 3. demonstrate a contextual knowledge of the biblical, classical, mythological and historical figures and events referred to in the set cantos;
- 4. appreciate and comment critically on the ideas, themes and style of the set cantos and of *Inferno* in general, in both spoken and written form.

Teaching format

This course is delivered through two lectures and one seminar per week as outlined in the course programme.

Mandatory course requirements (MCRs)

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students are required to do the following, unless specific exemptions have been agreed to:

- i. submit the two written essays by due dates in order to demonstrate their ability to comment critically in written form on ideas, themes and style of Dante's *Inferno*;
- ii. do a seminar presentation on a date agreed with the lecturer in order to demonstrate their ability to illustrate and comment in spoken form on ideas, themes and style of Dante's *Inferno*;
- iii. sit the two in-class tests in order to demonstrate knowledge of Dante's *Inferno*, as well as of his life, work and times.

Any student who is concerned that they have been (or might be) unable to meet any of the MCRs because of exceptional personal circumstances, should contact the course coordinator as soon as possible.

Workload

The University Assessment Handbook has laid down guidelines as to the number of hours per week which students are expected to devote to a course in order to maintain satisfactory progress.

Students enrolling in a 20-point course should work a total of 200 hours on this course. This means an average 16 hours per week, including the 3 contact hours – i.e., in the case of ITAL 306, 13 hours of private study outside class time. Please note that some students will find they need to do more than this, especially if they are aiming to achieve high grades.

Submission and return of work

All essays must include a cover sheet available from the SLC Office on the sixth floor of von Zedlitz (vZ610). Essays are to be handed into the Italian assignment box located to the left of the SLC Office (vZ610).

Corrected work can be collected from the SLC Office (vZ610) between the hours of 10am-2pm. You will need to show your student ID card to collect work from the office. All work not collected will be destroyed three months after the date of the final written test.

Please make sure to always keep a copy of any assignment you hand in.

Extensions and penalties

The due dates for the assignments given in the Course Programme must be adhered to. Although work may be accepted late in special circumstances, the Course Co-ordinator should always be contacted on or before the due dates if there is a problem.

The penalty for work presented late without prior approval is a 5% deduction per day. In addition, please note that up to a maximum of 5% may be deducted for poorly presented assignments.

Presentation of essays

Tidy presentation of essays is essential. Work may be typed or neatly handwritten. Crossings-out indicate that a piece of work is still at draft stage. Allow space for correction: leave a 4-centimetre margin and write on alternate lines. Do not write in pencil.
