Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1. describe accurately the sounds of English from articulatory, acoustic and auditory perspectives, and demonstrate an awareness of the sounds of the world's languages
- 2. use acoustic phonetic analysis to analyse connected speech processes, and relate this analysis to findings in the literature on the nature of these processes
- 3. understand fundamental phonological structures, from the segmental to the suprasegmental level, and describe them in formal terms
- 4. evaluate different theoretical accounts of given phonetic and phonological phenomena on the basis of new data

Teaching format

The content of LALS562 will be delivered through seminars as above, including practical sessions, and through students' own reading.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must attend at least 7 of the 10 classes. Attendance in MA classes is expected and important. This is in order to be able to develop and practice the linguistic analysis skills covered in the CLOs. It is also important as class sizes are small and so all students need to contribute to the class discussion. However, it is acknowledged that sometimes students will not be able to attend due to circumstances such as illness or injury, so 100% attendance is not required. If you cannot attend class, please let the course coordinator know in advance.

Any student who is concerned that they have been (or might be) unable to meet the MCR because of exceptional personal circumstances, should contact the course coordinator as soon as possible.

Workload

Course members should expect to spend at least 150 hours across the course on LALS 562 (including class time). This includes approximately 80 hours doing the assignments, and 50 hours reading and reviewing course material.

While the course requires a considerable amount of independent work, course members are also encouraged to study cooperatively by forming study and discussion groups and sharing ideas and resources with one another. Course members must prepare for classes by completing set readings in advance of the classes.

Marking criteria will be distributed with each assessment. Students should also make themselves familiar with the general MA grade descriptors (which will be posted on Blackboard). These will be particularly relevant for the research project.

Submission and return of work

Assessments should normally be submitted **BOTH** in hardcopy in class on the due date, **and** electronically through Blackboard. Instructions on how to use the BB assignment tool are on the BB website. Late hardcopies of assessments may be submitted to the School office.

Marked assessments will be returned within approximately two weeks of the due date.

Extensions and penalties

Extensions

If you require an extension for good reasons, ask the course coordinator ahead of the date for handing in the assignment. Evidence of exceptional circumstances, such as a medical certificate, may be required.

Penalties

Any assignment for which an extension has not been arranged, which is handed in after the due date, will receive a one grade penalty (e.g. if it is worth an A-, it will get a B+) for each working day

between the due date and when it is handed in. Assignments handed in more than a week after the due date will not receive a grade.

Students must adhere to the word limits for assignments. Assignments that are slightly excessive in length (more than 10% over the limit) will be marked down one grade, e.g. from a B+ to a B, or from a B to a B-. Assignments that are far over the word limit (more than 25%) will be marked down one full grade, e.g. from B+ to C+, or A- to B-.
