Prescription

The study and analysis of speech sounds and of the sound systems found in languages.

Course content

A schedule of the lecture and tutorial content will be distributed in lectures and will be made available on Blackboard.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1. demonstrate familiarity with the classification of speech sounds, including the International Phonetic Alphabet
- 2. analyse a range of speech sounds accurately using instrumental and auditory means, including features of connected speech
- 3. collect speech data, analyse it using acoustic analysis, and use the analysis to probe a research question related to phonetic theory
- 4. analyse a range of phonological phenomena in different languages, from the segmental to the suprasegmental level, in formal terms
- 5. discuss and evaluate theories about phonological systems in relation to speech data from different languages

Teaching format

The content of LING 228 will be delivered through lectures, tutorials and practical sessions and through students' own reading.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must achieve a mark of at least 30% in each assessment, in order to demonstrate the achievement of all the CLOs in the course. Note that, in accordance with the penalties for lateness set out below, each assessment can be handed in a maximum of two weeks after its due date in order to be graded and count toward the mandatory course requirements (unless an extension has been agreed with the Course Coordinator).

Any student who is concerned that they have been (or might be) unable to meet any of the MCRs because of exceptional personal circumstances, should contact the course coordinator as soon as possible.

Assessment will be based on two projects (3 and 5) and three short reports (1, 2, 4).

* Students need to complete one journal article summary, one practical report and one phonology tutorial analysis. There will be two or more of each to choose. Each report will have a different due within the period specified in the table above. The full list of options for each assessment and the due date for each will be given to students at the start of the trimester. Students will sign up at the start of the trimester to complete one of each by its due date. This will be explained further in lectures and on Blackboard.

N.B. Note that if no work is submitted for assessment before the last three weeks of teaching, there will be nothing on which to base an aegrotat consideration.

Marking criteria will be distributed with each assessment item.

Submission and return of work

Assignments should be handed in BOTH via the submission link on Blackboard AND to the lecturer (preferable) or to the LALS Office (VZ210) no later than 10.00am on the day the assignment is due. Please keep a back-up copy of your assignment.

Marked assignments will be returned in class, or be available to collect at the LALS Office, approximately ten days after the due date.

Extensions and penalties

Penalties

In line with School policy, assignments handed in after the due date will receive a considerably reduced grade unless accompanied by a medical certificate or other evidence of exceptional circumstances. For each <i>working day</i> in the week following the due date	One grade (5%) less and no feedback will be provided (the application of late penalties will not result in the grade dropping below 50%; where the assessed grade is 50% or less, no late penalties will be applied).
For assignments handed in later than 10.00am two weeks after the due date	No mark, and will not count towards the mandatory course requirements.
