Prescription

The course surveys recent and classic work in language and gender from a sociolinguistic perspective. It covers issues such as: how the category "gender" has developed over time in sociolinguistics; what the relationship is between gender identities and sexual identities; how the ways we talk intersect with non-linguistic behaviour to express gender identities.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course will be able to:

- 1 Outline the main issues in the field of gender and language research
- 2 Explain what issues and principles underlie major debates in the field
- 3 Discriminate between and define key terms in the field
- 4 Clearly summarise and contextualise (in writing and orally) key readings
- 5 Apply data (texts and recordings) to questions

Teaching format

The course is taught in a seminar format, with an emphasis on engaging with and discussing the application of linguistic and gender theory to real world data. Its format is directly comparable to LING 330 offered in alternate years.

Workload

In order to make satisfactory progress in this course you should expect to devote, on average, 15 hours a week to it. This includes background reading and participation in the lecture. Some of this time is also allocated to the preparation of the assignments and the in-class test which should also be spread across the course. Over the course, your expected workload should be approx. 200 hours, although students aiming for a high grade or who wish to maximise the extent to which they can draw connections between this course and their other courses will almost certainly spend more time.

People study in different ways and therefore allocate different amounts of time to the core activities in a course. There is no "one size fits all" formula. Here is a very rough idea of how you might spend 15 hours a week exploring sociolinguistics with this course.

Submission and return of work

Extensions and penalties
