Prescription

An introduction to fundamental written skills in music and to basic forms used in Western music, including introduction to the keyboard and practice in aural perception.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who have successfully completed this course will be able to:

1. apply the basics of musical notation, and of harmony, up to and including cadential progressions in major and minor keys up to two sharps or flats

2. identify by ear the fundamental properties of intervals, chords, and keys, and write down elementary tunes from dictation

3. use the keyboard to play very simple pieces, transpositions, and scales, in keys up to two sharps or flats.

Teaching format

This course comprises three 50-minute Interactive Lectures and one 50-minute Musicianship Lab per week.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

a) attend at least 80% of the Interactive Lectures and Musicianship Labs related to this course. Music is a practical subject in which the process of developing the outcome (whether composition or performance) is as important as the outcome itself. Attendance at the Interactive Lectures and Musicianship Labs is therefore an essential part of the course.

Students who are concerned that they have been (or might be) unable to meet any of the mandatory course requirements, because of exceptional personal circumstances, should contact the Course Coordinator as soon as possible.

Workload

A 20-point one-trimester course should require at least 200 hours' work (including class time). This means that during the trimester, the mid-trimester break and study week you should be prepared to spend, on average, 13 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments.

48 hours are spent in Lectures and Musicianship Labs. Outside these classes, the time should be allocated in proportion to the weighting of the different elements of the course. As a guide: 106 hours should be spent on study related to Theory: study groups, private reading, preparation of fragments and assignments, and revision for tests. 46 hours should be spent practising Musicianship skills, and 46 hours preparing the Musicianship project.
