Prescription

Study of chosen 20th-century repertoire of a particular composer or composers, or a group of works that are linked by a shared set of musical or conceptual parameters.

2015 Offering: The Blues. A close critical and analytical experience of a variety of blues-inflected contemporary musics and the discussion around them, as well as historical investigations into the role of the blues across genre boundaries. Today, the term the blues is used to mean everything from an emotional affect, a musical style, a harmonic form, a poetic form, an improvisational language, to a form of oral history. From the blues roots of American popular music through to present-day meanings, recreating what has long been a kind of pilgrimage in search of the 'roots' of the blues.

1. explain a range of contemporary and historical theoretical approaches to appropriate 20thcentury repertoire;

2. evaluate theoretical and discursive approaches to a variety of repertoire;

3. write effective and creative essays on musical works, practices, or issues related to the course.

Teaching format

This course comprises one 110-minute lecture and one 50-minute lecture per week. See attached course syllabus for more information.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

a) attend at least two Music Forum seminar presentations in the trimester the course is taught. This requirement develops skills in listening, engaging with, and critically assessing research presentations, and is related to the learning objectives of the course.

Students who are concerned that they have been (or might be) unable to meet any of the mandatory course requirements, because of exceptional personal circumstances, should contact the Course Coordinator as soon as possible.

Workload

A 30-point one-trimester course should require at least 300 hours' work (including class time). This means that during the trimester, the mid-trimester break and study week you should be prepared to spend, on average, 20 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments. Specific workload demands will change from week to week, based on the assessment schedule. However, as a general rule, each week you should plan to devote eight to ten hours to assigned reading and listening, five to seven hours preparing written work, and three hours reviewing previous materials and preparing for tests.
