Study will include consideration of ideals such as the concept of the work, "Werktreue", and fidelity to the composer, both in terms of their historical bases and their aesthetic implications for a wide range of contemporary classical performance traditions.

- 1.identify and explain at an advanced level the issues and concepts related to the historical and scholarly understanding of musical performance in the western classical tradition
- articulate at an advanced level how the abstract concepts studied can influence understanding
 of the process and products of musical performance, whether as listener, performer, or composer
 generate new critical work in music studies employing advanced skills in research and academic
 writing.

Teaching format

This course comprises one 3-hour lecture per week.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

a) attend at least two Music Forum seminar presentations in the trimester the course is taught. This requirement develops skills in listening, engaging with, and critically assessing research presentations, and is related to the learning objectives of the course.

Students who are concerned that they have been (or might be) unable to meet any of the mandatory course requirements, because of exceptional personal circumstances, should contact the Course Coordinator as soon as possible.

Workload

A 30-point one-trimester course should require at least 300 hours' work (including class time). This means that during the trimester, the mid-trimester break and study week you should be prepared to spend, on average, 20 hours per week involved in activities such as attending classes, reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments.
