Prescription

This course explores the nature of the mental by investigating accounts of the mind and cognition. Topics that may be discussed include the relationship between the mind and the body, consciousness, perception, intentionality, and mental content.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1. Understand a variety of debates in the fields of philosophy of mind and psychology.
- 2. Evaluate a variety of arguments in the fields of philosophy of mind and psychology using established methods of formal or informal logic.
- 3. Analyse complex ideas and concepts in the field of philosophy of mind and psychology.

Teaching format

This course will involve two two-hour lectures per week. There are no tutorials for this course. Students are expected to attend classes regularly, take part in class discussion, and keep up with the reading.

Mandatory course requirements

Other than obtaining an overall pass mark there are no mandatory course requirements.

Workload

In accordance with University_Guidelines, this course has been constructed on the assumption that students will devote 200 hours to the course throughout the trimester. An approximate indication of the hours to be spent on each component of the course is as follows:
