## Prescription

This course is a comprehensive examination of jurisprudence and the philosophy of law. Questions that may be discussed are: What is a law? From where do laws derive their authority? What is the relationship between the law, ethics and morality?

## Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course will be able to:

1. integrate disciplinary knowledge and skills developed at 200-level and apply them to the field of philosophy of law and jurisprudence
2. provide original arguments for or against contentious philosophical theses
3. engage in original and ethical research in philosophy under close supervision teaching format.

## Teaching format

PHIL 375 is taught in two two-hour lectures per week.

## Mandatory course requirements

There are no mandatory course requirements.

## Workload

This course has been designed on the assumption that students will devote approximately 200 hours to it throughout the trimester. This is an average of 14 hours per week across the 14 weeks of trimester. This includes attendance at two lectures each week. The remainder of your time will need to be shared between lecture preparation and making progress on assignments.

Although students have 24 hours to complete the take-home tests, they are each designed to take about one hour to complete.
