Prescription

This course will be an in-depth discussion of one or more problems in contemporary philosophical logic. Topics will change from year to year, but they may include vagueness, theories of truth, modal logic applied to problems in philosophy, or the philosophy of mathematics.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students passing the course will be able to:

- 1. Explain in depth a significant debate in contemporary philosophical logic or philosophy of mathematics;
- 2. Construct a position in this debate;
- 3. Defend that position in this debate.

Teaching format

PHIL 422 will be delivered for the first two weeks as lectures. After that, students will choose a topic for their essays and then we will meet only occasionally as a class. Students will have individual meetings with the instructor to discuss progress on their essays. These meetings will be scheduled by email.

Mandatory course requirements

There are no mandatory course requirements in addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%.

Workload

In accordance with University Guidelines, this course has been constructed on the assumption that students will devote 150 hours to the course throughout the trimester, approximately 11.5 hours a week across the trimester. This total includes doing readings, writing essays, and attending meetings with the instructor in the weeks they are arranged.

Assessment

Assessment for the course is based entirely on two essays.
