Prescription

Religion continues to be central to society, politics and culture in our world today. This course looks at the role of religion in shaping current debates about vital issues in New Zealand and overseas, such as radical atheism, fundamentalism, same-sex marriage, ethical politics and economy, and religious diversity.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course will be able to:

- Demonstrate an overview of selected and critical themes from a number of major religious traditions and their on-going impact in the contemporary world and the different ways in which they can be studied academically.
- 2. Demonstrate a critical and academic approach to the thinking and writing about religions.
- 3. Demonstrate the ability to express their views verbally and in writing and to develop their analytical, argumentative and communication skills.
- 4. Demonstrate developed academic reading, research and presentation skills.

Teaching format

This course includes both lectures and tutorials. The lectures communicate theoretical and descriptive materials, while the tutorials allow students the opportunity to develop their own communication skills through critical discussion of the readings and lectures.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

1. attend at least 7 out of 9 tutorials in order to demonstrate the achievement of all CLOs in the course.

Any student who is concerned that they have been (or might be) unable to meet any of the MCRs because of exceptional personal circumstances, should contact the course coordinator

Workload

For 20 point one trimester courses, 200 hours spread over the trimester are recommended. An average student should spend 13 hours per week for preparation, reading and writing in addition to attendance at lectures and tutorials.
