## Prescription

This course examines textual, theological and practical resources that religious believers use to inform their engagement with political and public issues. Contemporary issues are evaluated against the backdrop of historical debates concerning interactions of religion and politics. Case studies exemplify approaches to political thought and activism used within different traditions.

## **Course Content**

We shall examine the relationships: (1) between religion and the state; (2) between different religions within a state; and (3) between transnational religions. These relationships will be explored through a combination of theoretical models and case studies, both historical and contemporary. Concerns include issues of sovereignty; political and spiritual power; religious diversity; power, authority and law; and the management of religious diversity

# **Course learning objectives (CLOs)**

Students who pass this course will be able to:

- 1. have the knowledge and critical skills to analyse the realities and rhetoric of different religious diversity management models and to evaluate the merits and short comings of different systems.
- 2. have increased critical academic appreciation of the scholarly literature in the area.
- 3. have enhanced research skills in planning, researching, and presenting research.
- 4. have improved oral and written communication and presentation.

# **Teaching format**

This course is delivered through weekly seminars. The seminar programme may be varied from time to time. As much notice as possible will be given when changes occur and, a revised programme will be issued.

## Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

1. Attend a minimum of 80% of seminars in order to demonstrate the achievement of all CLOs in the course.

## Rationale for assessment

The research proposal and essay allow students to apply their analytical skills to information retrieved through library research on a set topic in planning an academic research essay. Essays demonstrate the students' level of proficiency in finding, understanding, and using sources. They develop the skills of critical reading, analysis, organizing and presenting material necessary for continued study in the area. The process also gives the opportunity to develop more in-depth knowledge of an area covered and the skills of critical analysis.

The seminar presentations allow students to develop their skills in small group teaching and discussion.

# Submission and return of work

Work for assessment must be submitted to the essay box outside the Programme office, KP14/203. Work shall be returned approximately 2 weeks from date of submission.
