Prescription

A course which concentrates on developing oral and written skills in the Samoan language. Emphasis on oral performance will be stressed in this course.

Course content

Samoan oratory will be examined by looking at concepts closely aligned with lauga (formal speech/es). A lecture-by-lecture breakdown is provided.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

This course has three main objectives, and each is of equal importance. Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1. have a good understanding and command of everyday spoken and written Samoan.
- 2. have a basic understanding of formal speechmaking.
- 3. have an appreciation/understanding of lauga in context.

Teaching format

The course will be organised into 3 x 1 hour lectures per week, 1 hour of tutorials and 1 hour of language laboratory per week. This is organised thus:

- 1. 3 lectures per week will consist of:
 - 2 x 1 hour lectures on the advanced study of the language
 - 1 x 1 hour lecture on oral Samoan language literature
- 2. 1 x 1 hour tutorial per week with focus on oral practise and communication
- 3. 1 x 1 hour language laboratory for practising oral work.

The Samoan Studies Programme works together with the Victoria University of Wellington Samoan Students' Association and Samoan Language Week in the promotion of Samoan language and culture.

Mandatory course requirements

All mandatory course requirements below ensure students meet all course learning objectives. In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- 1. Students must complete 10 blogs each to ensure that discussions around lauga is a shared discussion.
- 2. Students are to attend at least 8 out of 10 tutorial sessions to not only continue a shared discussion, but to ensure students are engaged with the assigned readings.
- 3. Each student is to attend at least 4 language labs to ensure they continue to work on their assessments.

4. All students must sit the final exam. The final exam enables students to document their understanding of all the course learning objectives of this course.

Any student who is concerned that they have been (or might be) unable to meet any of the MCRs because of exceptional personal circumstances, should contact the course coordinator as soon as possible.

Workload

The expectations are that students will work 10 hours per point, therefore a 20 point course equates to 200 hours over the trimester. This includes scheduled contact time, individual or group study, and work on assessment tasks.

Assessment

The course's assessment is divided into internal assessment and a final examination.

BREAKDOWN OF COURSE WORK

(1) Tusitala Blogs (10%)

Each student is to write 10 blogs beginning in Week 2 and ending in Week 11 in English. All blogs are entered on the SAMO 201 Blackboard page. Each blog is informal and aimed at documenting your thoughts about Samoan lauga. Although the tusitala blogs can be used to reflect your thoughts in alignment with class themes per week, students are also encouraged to blog about Samoan lauga in general.

All students are required to blog every week on any particular day. A minimum of 150 words for each blog is required.

(2) Lāuga in Photography

(10%)

This assignment encourages students to trace aspects of lauga through photography. For this assignment, choose three aspects of lauga and trace your chosen aspects in your community. Students are encouraged to be creative in regards to how their presentation is presented in class. In addition to your photography montage, students are to provide a one-page handout in Samoan outlining 1) three chosen aspects; 2) their selection criterias for their chosen aspects; and 3) how each aspect conceptually relate.

Students will present their photographic montage during tutorials in Week 4. This assignment will be submitted to the course coordinator in hard copy.

(3) Lāuga in Theory (20%)

This assignment is in essay format. Lāuga in Theory aims at enabling students to document and comment on lāuga in the existing literature. Using the same aspects you chose for assignment 2, what does the literature say about your selected aspects? Does the literature align with your tracing of lāuga in photos? Is there a gap in the literature? All essays are to have a:

- Fa'atūlima (Introduction)
- 'Autū (Body)
- Fa'amātafi (Conclusion)
- Full reference list
- APA referencing style
- typed using 12 font Times New Roman
- 1.5 spacing

(4) Contextual Oratory Assignment

(20%)

There exist many contexts in a Samoan community. These contexts can range from village, church, social groups, and so on. In discussion with the course coordinator, choose a context in your community. The aim of the Contextual Oratory Assignment is for each student to illustrate theories and aspects of lauga learned in the class environment in a performance format. By selecting your own context, students are assessed on a performed lauga in an environment they are familiar with and comfortable in. Each student is to abide by the following criterias:

- perform a lauga in a context of their choice.
- performance in the Samoan language.
- recording of performance as a media file (video)
- submit assignment as a media file.
- each media file is to be accompanied by a one-page handout in English outlining your chosen context and the type of lauga being performed. Also, include any additional information needed.

Students will present their Contextual Oratory Assignment in class during Week 10 (Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday).

Final Written Examination 40% in total

A three hour exam will be held during the examination period

The following will be tested in the exam:

- 1. Your understanding of basic ideas of Samoan lauga.
- 2. Your understanding of Samoan language honorifics/idioms/metaphors.
- 3. Your understanding of the cultural and social nuances of spoken Samoan.

TUTORIALS

You are required to attend 1 hour of tutorial per week. You are required to attend a minimum of 8 tutorials out of 10 for the trimester. Tutorials will start in the second week of classes.

Weekly readings will be discussed in tutorials. In preparation for tutorials, all students are to have read the weekly allocated readings prior.

LANGUAGE LABS

This is an important part of the programme in which students are expected to attend every session. A minimum of **4 out of 6 sessions** is required in order to satisfy course requirements. Each session is one hour. Language labs start in the second week of the trimester.

Submission and return of work

All written assignments are not to be submitted in hardcopy, but in electronic format only. Electronic assignments are submitted as a MS Word file through Blackboard. How to name your file and instructions for uploading your electronic assignment can be found on Blackboard in the "Assignments" section. Your mark and marked assignment with feedback will be found on Blackboard in the same section.

Grade and feedback comments for oral speech test and performance will also be entered on Blackboard within two weeks of the presentation.

Extensions and penalties

Extensions

Assignments submitted more than seven days after a due date or authorized extension will still be accepted in order to meet mandatory course requirements, but will not be marked. Penalties
