## Prescription

An introductory study of musical experiences from a range of cultural perspectives. 2015 Offering: This course provides an introduction to music studies in diverse cultural and social contexts. We will explore how people make and experience music in locations around the globe. We will also explore how issues such as ethnicity, place, gender, spirituality, technology, and politics influence (and are influenced by) music making in historical and contemporary settings. This course is intended for students with little or no previous background in formal music training. 100% internal assessment. In Trimester Three 2015, this course is offered online.

# **Teaching format**

This course is delivered through a series of video lectures, guided readings, and learning activities available through the course Blackboard site. These items will be uploaded to Blackboard weekly in a series of modules. This format allows you to work through the material within the weekly time frame according to your own schedule.

# Workload

A 20-point one-trimester course should require at least 200 hours' work (including class time). This means that during the trimester you should be prepared to spend, on average, 40 hours per week involved in activities such as reading, listening to recommended recordings and preparing assignments.

You should expect to spend 10 hours per week reading and listening to assigned texts and tracks, 10 hours per week completing online modules, and 20 hours per week preparing assignments.
