## **Prescription**

A critical analysis of the development of popular music from the 1950s to the present, examining diverse genres, the musical techniques employed to achieve the desired outcomes, and the cultural contexts in which the music is created.

2015 Trimester 3: The Beatles. It was more than fifty years ago that The Beatles had their first hit with 'Love Me Do'. The following eight years saw them release a dozen albums and tour the world to universal acclaim. Their music changed the face of popular music and the popular music industry, and their example influenced the wider culture. This course examines the music of The Beatles and the culture in which it was produced, and considers the traces their work has left in the cultural matrix. Students will listen to the music, read contemporary and subsequent accounts of the band, and use web-based resources to critically consider both this music and the contexts in which it was heard. 100% internal assessment. Trimester 3 is delivered by distance.

## Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who successfully complete this course should be able to:

- 1. describe and exemplify popular music from the second half of the 20th century until today
- 2. understand the structures of popular music and how they continue to develop through the mixing of genres that create new styles
- 3. critically define and discuss the major issues around the production and consumption of popular music.

## **Teaching format**

This distance course comprises 12 lessons. Each lesson comprises a number of readings and a set of questions (and in some cases a small project), by means of which students can reinforce their understanding of the key ideas addressed in the lesson.

## Workload

A 20-point one-trimester course should require at least 200 hours' work (including class time). This means that during the trimester you should be prepared to spend, on average, 40 hours per week involved in activities such as reading, listening to recommended recordings, and preparing assignments.
