Prescription

A multi-disciplinary survey of key methodological approaches and methods employed by social science researchers. The course includes critical discussion of the theoretical underpinnings of qualitative and quantitative approaches, ethics and the practice of social and cultural research. 100% internal assessment. Trimester 3 2015: SACS 201 will be taught by distance. This course is also able to be taken towards majors in CRIM or SOSOC, or a minor in SPOL.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

By the end of the course students should be able to:

- 1 demonstrate an understanding of the theoretical underpinnings of social research
- 2 demonstrate an understanding of research ethics
- 3 demonstrate an understanding of the principles of research design
- 4 demonstrate an understanding of a range of research methods

Teaching format

This delivery will be through Blackboard, with lectures provided in the form of audio 'podcasts' accompanied (in some instances) by PowerPoint.

Workload

University guidelines stipulate that a 20-point course should require 200 hours over a trimester, including class time, of student work. Because this course is being taught over five weeks, students should be prepared to commit a large amount of time to the course over the five weeks.

Student work provided for assessment in this course will be checked for academic integrity by the electronic search engine www.turnitin.com. Turnitin is an online plagiarism prevention tool which compares submitted work with a very large database of existing material. Turnitin will retain a copy of submitted material on behalf of the University for detection of future plagiarism, but access to the full text of submissions is not made available to any other party.

The essay must be submitted to Turnitin. To use it, go to www.turnitin.com, click on 'create a user profile' in the upper right corner. After creating an account, you can log in with your ID and password as with an e-mail account. Use the class ID and enrolment password to enrol in "Course ID"
