Prescription

The course includes a review of major principles of language teaching approaches, and introduces techniques for teaching sign languages.

Course content

The course will cover the following topics:

- Professional role of the teacher
- Classroom management
- Communicative Approach to language teaching
- Strands of a course
- Planning lessons
- Using a sign language curriculum
- Handling learner errors

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course will be able to -

- 1. Explain a communicative approach to teaching NZSL and contrast to other approaches
- 2. Describe strategies for managing students to promote language learning
- 3. Demonstrate understanding of sign language curriculum resources to teach NZSL lessons
- 4. Identify learning objectives appropriate for a beginner's NZSL course
- 5. Plan well balanced and sequenced lessons for NZSL learners
- 6. Apply knowledge of NZSL grammar structures to planning and teaching lessons

Teaching format

Class sessions will include lectures, group discussion, observation of NZSL classes, and practical tasks on lesson planning and teaching techniques.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of at least 50%, students must:

- Complete all assessment tasks
- Attend at least 80% (8 out of 10 half days) of all sessions during the teaching block. Attendance is important as practical learning is essential to achieving CLOs 3-6.

Any student who is concerned that they have been (or might be) unable to meet any of the MCRs because of exceptional personal circumstances, should contact the course coordinator as soon as possible.

Workload

Students can expect to do an average of 200 hours of work to make good progress in this course. This includes 35 hours of class time, plus group work, review of class work, reading time, preparation of assignments. During the week of classes at university, there will be some study tasks to complete in the evenings.
