PRESCRIPTION

The Reformation was among other things a cultural revolution. This course examines its impact in England.

It begins with late Middle English romances and includes one of the York mystery plays and medieval lyrics

featuring Christ as knight and lover. These provide the context for a reading of Edmund Spenser's post-

Reformation masterpiece The Legend of the Knight of the Red Cross as a pseudo-medieval romance strongly

reflective of the new ideology of the Reformation.

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COURSE LEARNING OBJECTIVES (CLOS)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1 demonstrate their comprehension and knowledge of the set texts;
- 2 analyse the set texts as exemplars of chivalric literature;
- 3 place the set texts in their cultural and historical contexts;
- 4 compare the set texts formally and in relation to medieval and Reformation ideologies;
- 5 express their understanding clearly in writing
- 6 present their written work in accordance with standard academic guidelines

TEACHING FORMAT

The twice-weekly lectures will allow for questions and some discussion, and some will feature audio-visual material. The weekly tutorials will be entirely discussion-based. It is important that you read the set texts (or the relevant parts of them) in advance of the lectures and tutorials devoted to those texts.

MANDATORY COURSE REQUIREMENTS

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

- submit credible attempts at the two assignments on or by the specified dates (subject to such
 provisions as are stated for late submission of work), and sit the test;
- sit the examination;
- attend at least 7 tutorials, so that they will have the opportunity to engage with the CLOs and prepare for the assessment of these in assignments and the examination.

Any student who is concerned that they have been (or might be) unable to meet any of the MCRs because of exceptional personal circumstances, should contact the course coordinator as soon as possible.
