Prescription

Selected 20th- and 21st-century texts studied in their social and historical context. The course will develop students' ability to write about these texts in a critical, informed and persuasive manner.

Course content

This course focuses on poetry, theatre, film and short fiction, with a common theme of literature and social crisis. How does creativity respond to such times? Is there a role for the literary when social structures break down? We begin with a study of selected poems from Prévert's *Paroles* and a play by Ionesco, *La Cantatrice chauve*, followed by a study of the Algerian War through two films, *The Battle of Algiers* by Gillo Pontecorvo and *Né quelque part*, a film by Mohamed Hamidi, and finally a short novel, *No et moi* by Delphine de Vigan.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

The overall aim of the course is to introduce students to a range of representations (form and content) of disruptions that may be experienced in societies under stress. Students who pass this course will be able to:

- 1. analyse, discuss and write a literary commentary on selected poems from Paroles;
- 2. analyse, discuss and write a literary commentary on La Cantatrice chauve;
- 3. analyse, discuss and write a commentary on an Algerian film in the context of Franco-Algerian history;
- 4. analyse, discuss and write a literary commentary on the short novel *No et moi*, showing a critical and theoretical understanding of relevant aspects of contemporary French society.

Teaching format

Students are expected to attend three lectures per week and do regular reading, preparation work or exercises before and after classes, as well as learn new vocabulary and concepts as the course progresses.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of 50%, students must:

• complete both tests and the required assignment work (essay) in order to demonstrate appropriate competence as outlined in the above section on CLOs.

Any student who is concerned that they have been (or might be) unable to meet any of the MCRs because of exceptional personal circumstances, should contact the course coordinator as soon as possible.

Workload

Students should devote 200 hours of study to this course. This includes attending lectures and tutorials as scheduled, and doing approximately 11 hours of independent study per week (eg. preparation and revision of class material, individual work).

Assessment

The two 50-minute tests scheduled in class times are designed to assess, at the end of two modules, students' ability to discuss the set texts in detail, through analysis and interpretation. Students should revise both texts covered to prepare for each test (around 10 hours).

The essay allows students to further analyse one of the set texts and will require around 20 hours of work. Instructions and guidelines are provided by the lecturer in charge in class and/or on Blackboard.

Marking criteria

Criteria for each assessment are explained in class and/or posted on Blackboard.

Submission and return of work

Students must include a cover sheet available from the SLC Office and place their work in the French assignment slot located to the left of the SLC Office on the 6th floor of von Zedlitz on or before the **due date, and no later than 3 pm**. Students may also be asked to provide a Word copy through Turnitin.

Students will be able to collect marked work from the SLC Office on the 6th floor of von Zedlitz between the hours of 10am and 2pm each day. A Student ID card will need to be shown to collect work.

Extensions and penalties

Extensions

Requests should be addressed to the appropriate lecturer as early as possible before the deadline or, if not foreseeable, on the same day the work is due. A replacement test will be organised only if prior arrangement has been made or if a medical certificate is produced.

Penalties

Late assignments may be accepted but will be penalised as follows if no prior arrangement is made: less 8% for the first day overdue; less a further 2% for each of the following days overdue.

Work handed in more than 8 days overdue, without prior notification, may at the discretion of the course coordinator be counted for course requirements but not marked.
