Prescription

An integrated course of literature and language designed to enhance the ability of students to read Latin more easily and develop an appreciation of Latin Literature.

Course Content

We are going to finish vol. 2 of *Disce!*, covering and reviewing grammar/syntax topics such as the passive, deponent verbs, participles, infinitives, indirect statements and questions, gerunds, gerundives, uses of the dative and ablative, subjunctive, purpose and result clauses, temporal clauses, sequence of tenses, supines, *dum*, *cum*, *ne*, *si* clauses, interjections, location and direction, clauses of doubting, hindering/preventing, relative clauses, etc.

After finishing the textbook, we will read passages by Virgil and Cicero from the Oxford Latin Reader.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course will be able to:

- 1) demonstrate increased understanding of the Latin language
- 2) read Latin with greater fluency
- 3) show growing knowledge and critical appreciation of Latin literature.

Teaching format

This course is taught via a seminar format in which the lecturer assists in explaining Latin grammar, vocabulary and translation; students participate fully in all activities such as explanation and learning, as well as reading and translating sentences and passages.

Mandatory course requirements

There are no mandatory course requirements. It is highly unlikely, however, that any student will complete the course satisfactorily without attending and fully participating in at least 80% of all classes and attempting all work set.

Workload

Students are recommended to spend a minimum, on average, of 12-14 hours per week on this course, allowing for a higher workload in the week leading up to a test, and allowing also for revision in the mid-trimester break. The assessments and non-assessed exercises are designed to allow both student and lecturer to evaluate the student's progress in accomplishing the objectives of the course. Assessment is designed to help the student and the lecturer to evaluate progress in three key areas, as well as to provide a final grade:

- memorisation of vocabulary and grammatical points.
- understanding of how vocabulary and grammar are used, tested by the translation of simple sentences of Latin to English or English to Latin.

• application of the student's knowledge by translating longer passages from Latin to English.

Assessment

Marking Criteria

- 1) You are expected to write legibly. What cannot be read will be counted as wrong.
- 2) Work in tests will be marked on the accuracy of your knowledge of Latin grammar and your understanding of vocabulary.
- 3) For your translations into English, you should stick close to the grammar and vocabulary of the Latin text, but your translations should also be in good fluent English: we will discuss this balancing act further in class. In general, your main aim is to make sure the examiner knows you have understood the material.

Submission and return of work

The assessment, consisting entirely of tests and the examination, will either be sat in class during the course in the case of internal assessment or in the examination room. The take-home assignment will be passed out one week prior to its due date and returned to the lecturer during class on the date specified above. Marking will generally be done prior to the next piece of assessment, in order that students will have some guidance on what areas they need to improve.

Extensions and Penalties

All in-term tests must be taken on the day set (or turned in on the specified day in the case of the take-home assignment), unless there are medical or other demonstrable extenuating circumstances. Variances will be considered upon application **before** the event.
