Prescription

This course covers advanced work in phonetics and phonology, including an exploration of recent research in this area.

Course content

A schedule of the lecture content will be distributed in lectures and made available on Blackboard. A separate hand-out will detail topics to be covered in the LING 428 seminars.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- 1. Use acoustic phonetic analysis to analyse naturally occurring speech in English and other languages
- 2. Relate patterns of connected speech observed in speech samples to models of speech production and perception
- 3. Critically compare different formal approaches to phonological phenomena in different languages, from the segmental to the suprasegmental level, to show how well they account for observed data
- 4. Demonstrate a critical awareness of major trends in phonological theory over the past 50 years
- 5. Carry out a semi-independent research project related to current issues in phonetics and phonology, including identifying an appropriate research question and collecting and analysing original data.







Teaching format

The content of LING 428 will be delivered through lectures and practical sessions, scheduled with LING 328. In addition, there will be regular research-focused seminars for the LING 428 students. Students will be expected to complete additional detailed reading, especially in areas chosen for research projects.

Mandatory course requirements

In addition to achieving an overall pass mark of at least 50%, students must:

make a satisfactory attempt to complete all the assessments. "Satisfactory" means that
where they have not reached a C- standard, work must nevertheless reflect the fact that the
assignment has been taken seriously and that a reasonable amount of effort has been
devoted to the task. In order to count toward the mandatory course requirements, each
assessment must be handed in no more than 2 weeks after its due date (taking into
account any extensions agreed with the Course Coordinator, see below).

This mandatory course requirement is to ensure that students have met the Course Learning Objectives (CLOs). As can be seen in the Assessment table below, different assessment items relate to different CLOs, and therefore it is important that students make a satisfactory attempt at all assessments so as to cover all the CLOs.

Any student who is concerned that they have been (or might be) unable to meet any of the MCRs because of exceptional personal circumstances, should contact the course coordinator as soon as possible.

Workload

Honours students are expected to devote at least 300 hours to this course over the trimester. This includes:

48 contact hours (36 lectures/practicals plus 12 LING 428 research meetings) Background reading/Revision of lecture material: 8hrs/week over 12 weeks

Practical assignments: 12 hours

Research/reading for Project: 12hrs/week over 12 weeks

Assessment will be based on two short practical assignments, and a research project assessed in two parts: a literature review and a final report.

The short assignments will be practical exercises designed to consolidate data analysis skills covered in lectures. The research project will be on a topic to be negotiated with the course coordinator, related to current issues in phonetics and phonology.

Marking criteria will be distributed with each assignment.

Submission and return of work

Assignments should be handed in BOTH via the submission link on Blackboard AND to the lecturer (preferable) or to the LALS Office (VZ210) no later than 12pm on the day the assignment is due. Please keep a back-up copy of your assignment.

Marked assignments will be returned in class approximately two weeks after the due date.

Extensions and penalties

Extensions

If you require an extension for good reasons, ask the course coordinator ahead of the date for handing in the assignment.

Penalties

In line with LING programme policy, assignments handed in after the due date will receive a considerably reduced grade unless accompanied by a medical certificate or other evidence of exceptional circumstances. Information on penalty arrangements will be included with detailed instructions for each assignment.

There will also be a penalty of one grade (5% of the total for that assignment) for going more than 10% over the word limit set for each assignment, and two grades for going more than 25% over the set word limit.
