Prescription

A project/research essay of approximately 10,000 words on a topic approved after consultation and the submission of a 500-word synopsis. In the first instance, please see the Linguistics Programme Director.

Course content

The precise content of this course will be determined in negotiation between the student and the supervisor.

Course learning objectives (CLOs)

Students who pass this course should be able to:

- i) build their own list of sources related to the topic of their research;
- ii) understand and evaluate literature related to their research topic;
- iii) present a written piece of research using the appropriate stylistic conventions for Linguistics;
- iv) demonstrate an awareness of the theoretical and methodological issues in the area of linguistics they choose to investigate;
- v) demonstrate the ability to design, carry out and report on a research project relevant to the topic.

Teaching format

Course work consists of an individual research project on a linguistic topic leading to an extended research essay.

Workload

You are expected to spend about 300 hours on this course over the whole trimester, which means on average around 25 hours per week, including the one hour per week of meeting time with your supervisor.

Assessment

Assessment will be based on a single piece of work, with an expected maximum length of 10,000 words, excluding references and appendices. The due date for this work is 13 June 2016. The student will be expected to submit drafts of this work as it is developed through the term, and feedback will be provided on this.

Submission and return of work

Two copies of the Research Project should be submitted, one as a hard copy and one electronic version. Electronic versions should be emailed to the supervisor and the hard copy given directly to the supervisor or handed in at the LALS Office (VZ 210). You should keep a back-up copy of your work. You can expect that your work will be graded and returned to you by not more than two weeks after you submit it. The marking criteria accord with how well the work that is produced demonstrates that the student can fulfil the course objectives above.

Extensions and penalties

Extensions

In line with the Linguistics Programme policy, assignments handed in after the due date will receive a considerably reduced grade (see below) unless accompanied by a medical certificate or other evidence of exceptional circumstances. If you require an extension for good reasons, ask the course coordinator ahead of the date for handing in the assignment.

Penalties

Projects which are handed in after the time and date on which they are due will be subject to a scale of penalties involving a reduction in the grade they are given, the severity of the grade reduction corresponding to the severity of the lateness. The details of the penalties will be set out with the instructions that are given with the particular task.

Set texts and recommended reading

Every student will need to determine their own reading lists, with support from the supervisor. Students will be expected to distinguish between relevant and irrelevant works, and to follow up leads in the literature they read.

Class representative

The class representative provides a useful way to communicate feedback to the teaching staff during the course. A class representative for LING Honours will be selected in the first trimester. Contact details for the class representative are distributed via email to all Honours students.

Student feedback

Student feedback on this course is welcome at any time. As the LING 489 course involves individual students working with different supervisors, it cannot be evaluated using the standard CAD evaluations.
