PRESCRIPTION

This course initially introduces students to the history, theories, genres, and culture of news media;

thereafter, it considers contemporary news texts and practices in terms of the contexts of globalisation, changes to the cultural field of journalism/media, and the advent of digital technologies.

COURSE LEARNING OBJECTIVES (CLOS)

Students passing the course should be able to:

- 1. Describe the practices within the field of news journalism
- 2. Critically analyse the transformation, in the digital age, of news culture and its practices
- 3. Critically reflect on the public sphere roles of journalism and news culture
- 4. Recognise the history of news culture within the wider context of the advent of communications and the culture industry.

TEACHING FORMAT
